PROTECTING CHILDREN AGAINST WHOOPING COUGH

In the waiting room of many physicians is a "notice" to parents stating that the Board of Health or State Medical Department advises inoculations to prevent whooping cough. Parents are advised that these inoculations should be given during the first year if possible—three injections at intervals of 14 days, and in some communities at intervals of one month.

Most of us, as we think of whooping cough, remember it as a mean time for patients and parents but have never considered it an important dangerous disease. However, a few months ago it was shown that mental and emotional disturbances may be caused by whooping cough which show no real symptoms until many years after the attack and, naturally, whooping cough is not suspected of being the cause. In a group of 500 children who had been observed in an institution, there were 243 or nearly 50 per cent who developed whooping cough. Of these 243 children, 58 were two years of age or younger when the attack of whooping cough occurred. In 34 of the 58, there appeared to be a definite relationship between the nervous symptoms immediately following the attack of whooping cough and behavior disorders, and personality changes shown by them later in life. Among these disturbances is epilepsy occurring in the teens and later.

In the "Journal of Pediatrics," Dr. D. La Pointe reports the results obtained by vaccinating 150 children once a week for three years against whooping cough in a large institution for children. These children were exposed to whooping cough for a longer period than is possible in a family and to a more massive infection. In spite of these unfavorable conditions, not more than 10 per cent of the vaccinated (immunized) children developed whooping cough and none had complications or died. On the other hand, of the 550 who were not vaccinated against whooping cough, 450 were attacked by whooping cough, six developed bronchopneumonia, and five died.

From the above facts, despite the mother's desire to spare her child the slight pain of the hypodermic needle, it is only fair that all children should be protected against whooping cough and the nervous disturbances which occur later in life.
