FREE TRADE SENATOR GETS INTO TROUBLE

Talks to a Friend in New York on the Fiscal Question and is Reported as Favouring Champ Clarkism

(Special to The Guardian)

NEW YORK, April 4.—Over the long distance telephone from Atlantic City this morning, Senator William C. Edwards, of Ottawa, indignantly and emphatically denied having made the prediction, credited to him in alleged interviews published in New York papers this morning, that inside of ten years Canada would be annexed to the United States, and that there was the strongest sentiment on the part of the Canadian people in favor of amalgamation.

"It is absolutely and positively untrue," Senator Edwards told The Journal correspondent.

"I never made such a statement. I was not even interviewed. I mentioned in the course of a private conversation with a friend that I thought that if the question of reciprocity was to be put to a vote in Canada now, the decision of 1911 might possibly be reversed. The distortions printed in the papers are absurd. I deny them in the strongest possible terms."

Senator Edwards was most vigorous in his assertion that no thought of annexation had been expressed, even in the vaguest way, and declared himself amazed and indignant that such remarks should have been credited to him.

"Do you, or do you not, believe Canada will eventually amalgamate with the United States?" was asked. "No, I do not," was the Senator's remark.

What Interview Alleged

NEW YORK, April 4.—Two New York morning newspapers, the Tribune and the American, publish the following today:

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., April 3.—"Canada will be annexed to the United States within the next ten years," is the prediction made here today by Senator William C. Edwards for more than thirty years a member of the Canadian Parliament, and one of the foremost business men in the Dominion. Senator Edwards, who is stopping at the Hotel Traymore, continued:

An Economic Reason

"Economically and industrially there is every reason why the two great American countries should be united under one Government. Old ideas on the subject have been swept aside by the close associations of the Governments, business men and by men in service during the war. There is the strongest sentiment taking deep root throughout the Dominion in favor of amalgamation, and from observations that I have made everywhere in Canada there is every reason to believe that annexation will have been accomplished within the next ten years."

Always a Free Trader

Senator Edwards, as is well known, is a pronounced free trader. A few years ago he used to be known as "Canada's only free trader" because of his uncompromising opposition to any barriers to international trade. Senator Edwards has also for years held that Canada would have little to lose and much to gain from joining with the United States; but such views have been hitherto unpopular that the Senator has not given public expression to them. Senator Edwards is a man of very pronounced opinions on a number of subjects and because of the vigor with which he defends them his friends frequently for sport throw their hats into his ring.

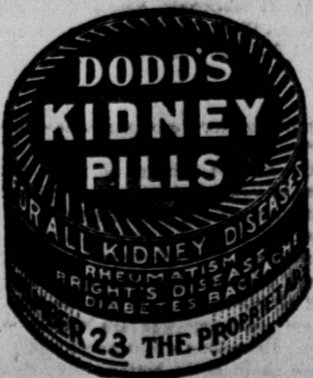
