## FORMER PREM. HAS HOPE FOR LAND SCHEME.

### Lloyd George Tells Welsh Liberals That Plan Will Go to Caucus Soon.

### TALKS OF COMPROMISE

### Recent Attack on Labor Party Causes Much Speculation in London.

LONDON, Jan. 27.—None of a compromise between the different sections of the Liberal Party regarding his land scheme was held out by ex-Premier Lloyd George to the Welsh National Liberal Federation in a speech at Cardiff today. He stated that at the Liberal Party conference at London next month a series of proposals drafted by the executive of the Liberal Federation on the basis of a "white paper" would be presented. That was a compromise. He himself would have preferred the "green book" in which his scheme was outlined in its original form, but inside the party, he said, there must be a compromise of views which the object of reviving something which he represented as the united aspirations of the party as a whole.

The moment Lloyd George chose for his declaration of independence from the Labor Party was a curious one. On the face of it, at any rate, he finally declared he would have no more dealings with it, except on condition it was sure to refuse. Yet before a month has passed his relations with his own party may be in jeopardy.

It is by no means certain that the meeting of the National Liberal Federation, set for the middle of February, will accept the ex-Premier's radical land scheme. At any rate, his rivals in the Asquith wing are sure to criticize it severely and even if a window dressing resolution of unity is ultimately passed, his personal position may be easily become more uncomfortable.

With such a prospect immediately ahead of him, his outspoken attack on the Socialists seems inopportune and has naturally aroused much speculation. Several leading political reviews have preserved an unnatural silence concerning his outbreak. The National records three different interpretations of it as an offer to the Socialists, as a bid for a new party, as a move toward an election pact.

The Outlook alone takes a definite stand and declares that "Lloyd George's position is much to be commiserated, even by his opponents."

"The defection of Sir Alfred Mond," it says, "makes him definitely the lost leader, a man with a policy but no party. If he were anybody else I should suggest that he become Lord Cromwell, for he could not be more lonely in the House of Lords than in the Commons. Probably he would think the remedy worse than the disease, but it would certainly be the quickest way to a restoration of the Liberal Party. After all, human sacrifice is not unknown in among more primitive tribes as a means of salvation."

With such a skilled tactician as Lloyd George in question it is foolish to pass over the suggestion that he chose to make his anti-Socialist declaration in order to strengthen his hand in forcing his land reforms upon the Liberal caucus. To come to it with his record of great service and his somewhat mythical money-bags and to ask his fellow-Liberals to note how firmly he had withstood the handshakes of Labor might reasonably be reckoned so to establish his claim to true liberalism as to secure many waverers to the land scheme he has at heart.

But even if he has made no such Machiavellian move as this, and he truly believes that the Liberal Party can re-establish itself by acting as a third party, Lloyd George would after all be playing the part he is particularly fitted for.

He has always fished in troubled political waters. Hopeless as the plight of both the Labor and the Liberal opposition seems at the present—and it may be noted that a weekly with as few Conservative sympathies as The New Statesman has recently declared bluntly that they, "failing some miracle, will remain for many years to come the largest, strongest and most coherent party in the House"—Lloyd George may see some personal hope for himself as the most expert political angler of the time.

Such a situation must bristle with possibilities, and whether at the moment he possesses a party or not, who can doubt, that if opportunity arises no one is so capable of grasping it as Lloyd George?
