WORLD'S RECORDS BROKEN.

LEXINGTON, Ky., October 6.—The Transylvania for 212 trotters, value \$5,000, today, resulted in possibly the greatest contest in the history of the trotting turf, and was won by Sweet Marie in the three final heats, the first two heats going to Tiverton. Four world records were made in the Transylvania to-day, besides lowering the even record and making the fastest mile of the year on any track. When Tiverton won the first heat in 2:03 1/2, he lowered the event record and made the fastest trotting record of any horse this year. When he won the second heat in 2:04 he again lowered these records and made the world's record for the fastest second heat trotted in a race.

 FOR A PURE ELECTION.

The eight candidates for the Commons carrying the standards of our two great political parties in Prince Edward Island have now entered upon their canvass. They are men of fair repute and we hope they are animated by honest and patriotic motives. Upon them much will depend as to the manner in which the election three weeks hence will be conducted. We invite them one and all to join in a determination to make it a pure election. We are building a nation which is rapidly growing in wealth and prosperity. Its greatest danger lies in those corrupt and creeping influences which have developed in connection with our electoral system, and which in too many cases have produced shameful and alarming results in the past.

It ought to be possible for the opposing candidates and their active supporters to come to an agreement that no man shall be paid for his vote or supplied with liquor as an inducement to vote for any individual candidate or party. This would be an honest and patriotic thing to do. No man whose opinion is worthy of respect could object to it. Let those who will not vote unless paid or supplied with liquor stay at home—the country would be better off without their votes if they will not cast their ballots as honest and self-respecting men. Then we shall have the election decided, as it ought to be by the upright, unbought, free and independent electors of the land. The opposing candidates will each have the same chance in a pure election as they would if money and whiskey were poured out like water on both sides.

In a pure election, the candidate, whether elected or defeated retains his self-respect and the respect of the entire community. He has nothing to reproach himself for and he has no fear of the election court. A pure election is also the cheapest election whether for candidate who wins or loses. If our elections were purely conducted we should not hear, as we now sometimes do, of public men who have been impoverished by political contests, and of others well fitted for useful public service, who will not accept a nomination because elections are too costly. The man who buys his way into Parliament cannot be trusted to devote himself disinterestedly to the service of the country. He will be sure to try and get his money or its equivalent back in some form, in office or contract or consideration for himself or his relatives or near friends. Nothing so degrades public life, nothing so demoralizes a people or endangers the best interests of the state as corruption in elections.

Not only the candidates but all good citizens have a responsibility in regard to maintaining the purity of our elections. We need a healthier public sentiment in these matters, that will frown upon and despise the dirty traffic in votes. Our ministers, teachers, churches and temperance societies can do much to create a healthy public opinion in these matters. Let it once be known that the briber and the bribed are alike despised and the fact will go far to check this great evil. And there is another most reprehensible practice that ought to be frowned upon. We refer to the practice of soliciting from candidates subscriptions and donations to churches, halls, parsonages, schools and charities. It is really a most reprehensible form of bribery, conducted in the guise of religion, charity or morality, but little less reprehensible in some cases than highway robbery. We know whereof we affirm in this matter. Pastors and church workers who want to put down corruption, as we feel assured they do, should consider well what they are

doing before holding up a candidate for a subscription which he can perhaps ill afford but dare not refuse for fear of incurring the disfavor of an entire congregation or of seeming to be less generous than his rival.
