A P. E. ISLAND exchange says that while some good catches of lobsters are now being made the season's pack for the island will be at least a third short of an average one. This is a rather peculiar report in view of the fact that many of the factories along the North Shore of this Province have been unable to conveniently care for all the fish the fishermen have brought in. A prominent lobster packer told us the other day that he has put up more than he hoped to, has over and would welcome an agreement to close down by the end of June rather than lose money or swap dollars, as he believes will be the case, should fishing operations continue later than that date. It is safe to say that, taken as a whole, the lobster catch for the Gulf factories this season will far exceed in quantity that of any recent year.—Pictou exchange.

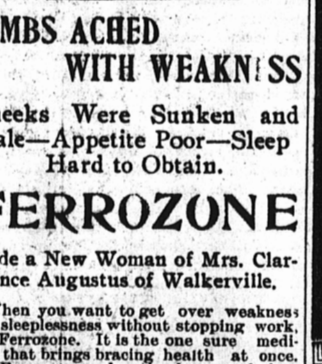
