The S. S. Cacoua arrived here Friday morning from Montreal with a large general cargo merchandise. She sailed Saturday evening for St. John's Newfoundland via the Sydneys. Her outward cargo from here consisted of 3,500 bags oats, 600 bags potatoes, turnips vegetables and 194 barrels vegetables 120 pkgs. butter 122 tons hay, 90 head cattle, 180 sheep besides sundry other cargo.
