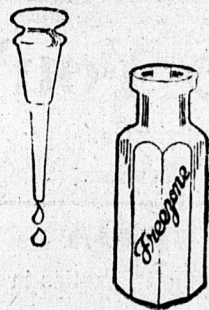

TRACTOR DEMONSTRATION.—Mr. I. C. Archibald of the Cleveland Tractor Company, Cleveland, Ont., returned Tuesday from Tryon where he gave an interesting tractor demonstration. Yesterday he started work on the Lower St. Peters Road with the tractors attached to Government road machines and showed what great results can be accomplished with them. It was shown that these wonderful machines are adaptable for a great number of uses in farm work not only for plowing and harrowing but for hauling lumber and mussel mud and other heavy loads. On account of the Cleveland having 600 square inches of traction surface it is claimed that it is possible to go with this where others would slip. In a recent competition demonstration at Kingston, N. S., the Cleveland plowed an acre of land in 39 minutes. This was land which had not been plowed for 15 years.

CHURCH WRECKED BY EXPLOSION

PRESQUE ISLE, Me., May 14.—One mystery was replaced by another Sunday when an explosion which shook the village last Thursday night was explained. Until Sunday the scene of the explosion could not be located but when the Methodist Episcopal Church opened for the Sunday morning service it was found that the piano had been blown to pieces apparently by dynamite. Considerable damage was done to the interior of the church. No reason for the act is known and there is no clue to the person who set off the charge.

ADDRESS AND PRESENTATION.—On the evening of Thursday May 1st Capt. Rev. G. C. Taylor gave a very able address in the hall at Hunter River. Rev. R. H. Stavert presided and after a chorus had been sung by the choir Mr. Stavert introduced the speaker of the evening, Mr. Taylor held his audience as if spell bound for over an hour as he told of his many thrilling experiences at the front. Before closing Mr. Taylor made



a strong appeal in behalf of the Red Triangle Y. M. C. A. work. After Mr. Taylor's address a reception was held for a number of the returned heroes. While preparation was made for four, only one was able to be present viz Mr. Lyle McMillan. Rev. R. H. Stavert read an address to Mr. McMillan and Miss Rubie McDougall presented him with a signet ring. After Mr. McMillan had thanked the people for so kindly remembering him the audience joined in singing "For he's a jolly good fellow." Rev. G. C. Taylor then presented Mrs. Wm. Taylor with a signet ring in memory of her brother who had fallen at the front. After the singing of a chorus a dainty lunch was served by the ladies. The remainder of the evening was spent in games. Before breaking up Mr. McMillan the guest of the evening, Mr. D. M. McDonald and others were bounced. The singing of the National Anthem brought the evening's entertainment to a close.

ROTARY YESTERDAY.—The weekly luncheon of the Rotary Club was held yesterday at the Davies Hotel, Rotarian McKee presiding. Mr. C. J. Gallagher contributed an enjoyable solo. Colonel W. B. Prowse, D. S. O., was the speaker for the occasion. Owing to brief notice beforehand he said he was not prepared to give any detailed description of anything like a battle but would confine his remarks to few reminiscences of the war. Before doing so he wished to pay a tribute to the efficiency and bravery of his brother

officer, Major Peako. He stated that the Major had to contend with superior officers who treated him in a very unfair manner and that Major Peako's actions under the circumstances were thoroughly justifiable, and the Major in cases of dispute where an investigation was held was triumphantly vindicated. The several incidents related by Colonel Prowse were very interesting, notably the one telling of a Canadian artillery officer who was short of men and guns asked permission to use the Hun prisoners. By some means or other he succeeded in getting permission; he called for volunteers and a German officer and they came forward and worked the guns, banging away against their own men and thinking it a great joke, to do so. In referring to the work of the Steep Battery the Colonel said the hardest experiences was the six months on the Somme where as many as 1000 tons of ammunition were handled in one day. He extended thanks to the people of the Island for their great kindness in sending socks and comforts to the Battery. In relating a case of individual bravery he told how Sgt. Jim Lightizer after a night fight had been shot away, from behind the Battery, deliberately walked to the place amid falling shells and held aloft his flashlight until the regular light had been procured. The Colonel was loudly applauded on resuming his seat. Prof. Earle was pianist for the occasion. A number of visitors were present who greatly enjoyed the spirit of good fellowship prevailing.
