Halifax: No change in prices of barrelled apples since last report. Nova Scotia boxed apples \$2.50; onions \$8 per hundred pound bag; potatoes \$4 per ninety-pound bag. During the week ending February 28, 5,487 barrels of apples were exported to Manchester, 3,157 to London and 4,992 to Glasgow from this port.

St. John, N. B.: No change in fruit or vegetable prices since last report. Arrivals for week ending March 6, one car imported mixed fruit and two cars of local potatoes. Montreal: Auction prices for Nova Scotia apples: No. 1 Golden Russet \$8.05; No. 2 \$6.60 to \$7. No. 3's \$5.30, No. 1 Baldwins \$5.50; No. 2's \$4.50, No. 3's \$3.40; No. 1 Stark \$7, No. 2's \$6.50 Very few Ontario apples offered at auction. Potatoes, limited stock in store, best white \$3.40 to \$3.50 per bag in car lots on track. Onion market firm, Quebec reds \$8.50 per 75-pound sack. Spanish onions per large crate \$8.50, small crates \$2.50. Arrivals for week ending March 6, 14 cars N. S. apples, 4 cars Ontario, and 1 car imported boxed apples. Quebec: Nova Scotia Apples No. 1's \$9, No. 2's \$8, Domestic \$7 to \$7.50, No. 3's \$5.50 to \$6; Baldwin, Stark and Ben Davis, No. 1's \$7.50 to \$8; No. 2's \$7, Domestic \$6.50, No. 3's \$6. British Columbia Winesaps, No. 1's \$5 to \$5.25 per box; McIntosh Red \$4.25 to \$4.50; Jonathan, \$9.50 to \$10 per bag of 75 pounds, Spanish, per case \$10.
