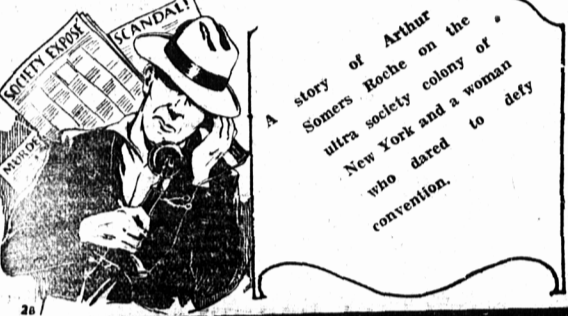

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 15.—The 1928-29 schedule of the National Hockey League which was released today reveals that opening games will be played on Thursday, Nov. 15, and last scheduled contests will be staged on Saturday, March 18.

Opening games include Montreal at Canadiens, New York Rangers at Ottawa, New York Rangers at Detroit, Boston at Pittsburgh and Chicago at Toronto, all ten teams getting into action on night of opening night. Closing night on March 18 schedules Toronto at Ottawa, New York Americans at Canadiens, and Boston at Pittsburgh. In all, 220 games are scheduled, each team having 22 home stands.

MAR. BOXING TOURNEY FOR BIGGEST TOWN

GLACE BAY, Oct. 15.—The Maritime boxing championships for this year have been awarded to Glace Bay, in keen competition with St. John, Moncton, Charlottetown, Amherst, New Glasgow, Springhill and Halifax.

This will be great news for the Cape Breton fight fans, who are now assured of seeing the greatest boxing feast ever served up to them.

The bouts will be staged the second week of November, likely on the 7th and 8th and the classes will be flyweight, bantamweight, featherweight, lightweight, middleweight, light-heavyweight and heavyweight. All entries are to be sent to D.H. McFarlane, Glace Bay.

This will be the third time for the Maritime championships to be awarded to Glace Bay. The town was awarded the championships in 1914 and 1920, but the past seven years other towns and cities in the Maritimes have been favored in getting the bouts, though the boxing teams sent from Glace Bay and surrounding areas to the tournaments usually won the majority of the championships.

The bouts will be staged in compliance with the amateur rules. All entrants will be supplied with entry forms and the most important of these will be the Maritimes official to officiate at the bouts.

The powers that be are showing a commendable spirit in recognizing the claims of Cape Breton in all sports of late, in striking contrast to former years, when Glace Bay and other Cape Breton centers were usually the losers in all matters pertaining to amateurism.

President Fraser and Secy. Treas. Shipley have made it plain that they are out to give Cape Breton a fair deal and they have gone a long way toward doing so by giving Glace Bay the Maritime title championship bouts for this year.

Island boxers would do well to start training if they intend to enter any of these bouts.

Clarence Demar Ran Second

PORT CHESTER, N. Y., October 15.—Albert Janvin, of New Rochelle, N. Y., running under the N. Y. U. insignia, won the fourth annual marathon race from New York City to this place this afternoon. His time was two hours, 57 minutes and 37 seconds.

Clarence Demar, of Melrose, Mass., noted marathoner, was second in three hours one minute 40 3-5 seconds. Guy Cenprinn, of Brooklyn, was third, and Percy Weyer, of Monarch, A. C., Toronto, was fourth.

The distance from the New York A.C. clubhouse on fifty-ninth street to Summerfield Park here is 26 miles 385 yards. The race is sponsored each year by the Port Chester Board of Trade.

Loses Tongue As He Takes Babe Ruth Cup

NEW YORK, Oct. 15.—J. Calasano, sixteen year old baseball star of the "Renaissance" Club of Brooklyn, hit his home runs in 50 games during the American Legion's baseball season, but he couldn't open his mouth to say a word yesterday at Dexter Park when Babe Ruth presented him with the Babe Ruth trophy.

With 25,000 fans gathered around him, Babe Ruth standing there before him, Calasano almost dropped the trophy when Ruth handed it to him, the young home run hitter confessed afterward.

FRIGHTENED BY BABE

"I was so frightened by Babe that I couldn't say a word," Calasano said. "I opened my mouth to thank him, but I couldn't make a noise. Then I almost dropped the trophy. I ain't so good at these ceremonies. I'd much rather be up there at the plate swinging my old hickory."

Young Calasano may not have known it, but he was taking a leaf right out of the Babe's book when he told about his emotions on receiving the trophy.

VERDICT ON COLLEEN MOORE'S HILARIOUS NEW COMEDY.

Whether Colleen Moore plays in romance, tragedy or comedy seems to be of small importance, for she may be depended upon to be equally enjoyable in each.

Her latest, and possibly most entertaining picture "Oh Kay!" is an uproarious farce comedy, which delighted the audience at the Prince Edward Theatre yesterday at its first local showing. Taken from the musical comedy of the same name, "Oh Kay!" has been developed into a screen farce seldom surpassed in the number of hearty laughs included. Colleen's saucy personality dominating the humorous action throughout.

"Oh Kay!" brings home the truly amazing versatility of talented Miss Moore, for her appearance in this gay comedy follows an equally successful excursion into the field of serious drama, love story. From the moment of a decidedly clever introduction of Colleen until the novel fade-out, "Oh Kay!" offers entertainment plus for the whole family—from baby to grand-father. The humorous high-point of the story is the pre-nuptial luncheon, at which Kay officiates as serving maid in order to explain her presence in the boy's home. The manner in which she and a tipsy butler interrupt the orderly procedure of the luncheon is both original and screamingly funny, as yesterday's audience will attest.

Miss Moore's supporting cast in "Oh Kay!" is unusually good. Lawrence Gray plays opposite the star with Alan Hale, Ford Sterling, Claude Gillingwater, and Julian Johnson in other prominent roles. "Oh Kay!" was produced for First National Pictures by John McCormick.
