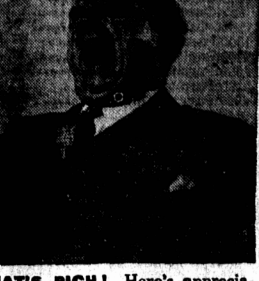

Jiant Catfish Have Odd Diet



WASHINGTON, Dec. 3-(AP)—A rugged, giant catfish which eats rocks and another which has developed a taste for bananas were described Saturday night by the Smithsonian Institution. The catfish reside in Siam. The Smithsonian reports some of these big Siamese polysters are found with stones the size of a man's fist in their stomachs. Finding it hard to conceive that even a catfish munches rocks for rocks' sake, the scientists say they presume the stones 'are swallowed inadvertently in efforts to detach algae from them.'

Now bating an eye, the Smithsonian caps its story with a description of a catfish that has developed a taste for bananas. It has developed its snout into a sucking organ which curls the fish to attach itself to rocks in a stream.

Stock Markets At A Glance

CHICAGO, Dec. 3 - (AP) - Traders became more nervous about the rye ceiling regulations today and liquidation pushed the May contract down the five-cent-a-bushel daily limit at times.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3 - (AP) - The price of New York Stock Exchange memberships rose today to the highest level since 1937 when one sold for \$60,000, up \$1,000 from a transaction reported a few hours earlier. This was the best price since \$65,000 on July 20, 1937.

TORONTO, Dec. 3 - (CP) - In the heaviest trading in two weeks the Toronto Stock Market advanced today to show substantial index gains for all groups. In the early session the cheaper golds and Base Metals had the run.

NEW YORK, Dec. 3 - (AP) - Last-minute burst of buying in motors, steels, aviation and assorted industries, including selling of rails and some pivots, put the Stock Market ticker tape minute late today and raised volume to the best level since last June.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 3 - (CP) - Rye futures prices on the Winnipeg Grain Exchange today declined the five cent limit in a quiet session, the market reflected similar declines of five cents at Chicago. Prices opened under profit-taking. The close was up a cent net.

MONTREAL, Dec. 3 - (CP) - Security prices advanced on a broad front today on the Stock Exchange and Curb Market. Papers and industrials went to new eight-year highs in the indices and utilities were at their best level for five years. Banks set a new mark since the average of the group was instituted last year. In the sub-divisions of the key groups, beverages and metals scored the most notable increases.
