### 1378 RUNNING CHAMP KEEPS UP THE PACE

WINNIPEG, Aug. 16 (CP) — It wasn't much of a chore for W.V. Stevenson of Winnipeg to blow out the candles on his birthday cake — all 90 of them.

Nicknamed the "Black Horse of Mount Forest," Mr. Stevenson was champion runner of the world "way back" in 1878. He says he still has "lots of wind."

He gives his recipe for longevity in one word — activity.

"Some people are so lazy they won't even run for a street car," he said.

He claims walking is wonderful for the constitution — and he ought to know. At 90 he is still hale and hearty, stands six feet two inches and is as straight as a young man. He has been said to walk a mile a day.

"Shoot — that's nothing," said Mr. Stevenson, shaking his thick, white hair emphatically. "I walk two to five miles every day."

Of course, he has heredity on his side. His father lived to be 104, his mother to 97. His sister was 22 when she died. A temperate man, Mr. Stevenson plans to beat his father's record. He was born in Mount Forest, Ont., and came to Winnipeg in 1882.
