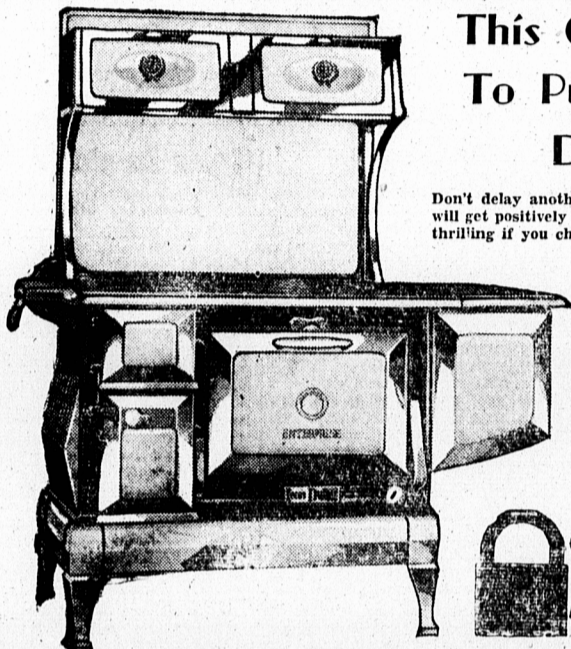

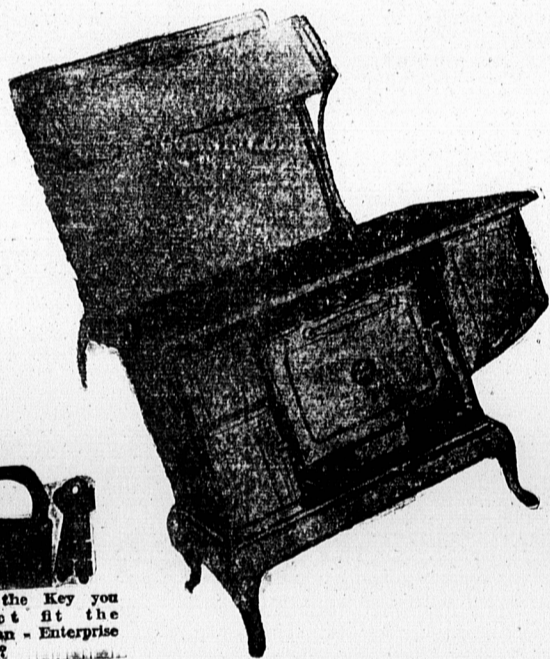

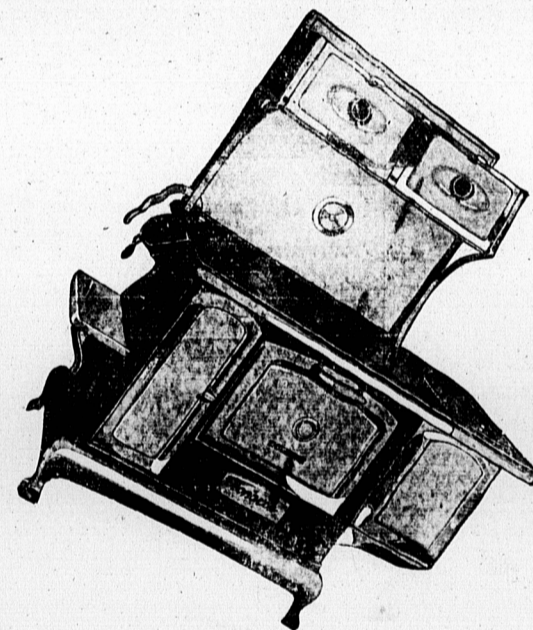

Railway Board Hearing Adjourns

(C.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Nov. 27—Preliminary investigation by the Federal Conciliation Board appointed to inquire into demands of Canadian railway employees for restoration of a 10 per cent wage cut imposed in 1931 concluded today and hearings of the board, adjourned to Dec. 9.

Chairman Justice A. K. MacLean announced the board would meet in Montreal next month and that representatives of the railways and the employees would file written briefs in the interim.

Before the hearing adjourned, Howard B. Chase, Labor representative, asked that the board consider in their findings the three per cent pension contribution which employees of the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific must make in addition to the 10 per cent reduction from their basic wage scale.

George Hodge, railway representative, said the voluntary pension contribution was made with the approval of the employees.
