Embarkation of the Boer Prisoners.

THE MOUNTED RIFLES Formed the Guard--Talks to Boer Officers--Cronje Refused to Wash.

A letter from Cape Town to the Montreal Herald, dated April 3rd, gives the following account of the embarkation of Cronje and his fellow prisoners for St. Helena.

ESCORTED CRONJE. It was whispered on Friday last that a large number of Boer prisoners, including General Cronje, were to be taken to St. Helena in our Canadian transport Milwaukee, and we all felt proud that our ship had been selected, but there was great rejoicing in the camp when it was known that the guard of one hundred and fifty men which was to escort them to the steamer was selected from the Canadian Mounted Rifles.
