### CONGREGATION HAS FIGHT IN CHURCH

PARIS, Aug. 7.—A quarrel between the congregation of the Church of St. Apollinaire, at Dijon, and the new bishop of the diocese led to an uproarious scene and a free fight in the church yesterday.

The cure, Abbe Lorimier, had at first disobeyed the bishop's request that he would send in his resignation, and the bishop, therefore, deemed it necessary to hold a ceremony of purification in the church.

Half the congregation sided with the bishop and half with the cure, and on the bishop's arrival yesterday their pent-up feelings found expression in church. The two factions shouted the names of their respective favorites at each other and the shouts finally led to a free fight, which continued till the police were brought in to restore order. The ceremony was then held.

### MISFIT IN CLOTHES COUNT IN PRISON

PARIS, Aug. 7.—Count Marie Alexandre de Monti de Reze has been sentenced by a Paris court to one year's imprisonment and a fine of \$49 for assaulting his tailor and severely injuring a policeman who went to the tailor's assistance.

The tailor, M. Aconard, took a new suit to the count's room and tried on. The count was displeased with the "fit" and flung the garments out of the window into the street, where they were promptly seized by a passing tramp. The tailor remonstrated with the count, who handled him and the policeman so roughly that the latter had to be taken to the hospital.

The count was ordered to pay the policeman \$240 damages.

### KING'S VISIT COST FRANCE \$500,000

PARIS, Aug. 7.—King Stowath of Cambodia, whose departure from this city was hastened by the foreign office authorities was bitterly disappointed at not being allowed to remain longer in Paris.

"A total estimated outlay of \$500,000 and no return for our money" is the way a thrifty Frenchman sums up the royal visit.

It is estimated that the cost of the visit to the government alone amounts to \$250,000. This sum will be a heavy charge in the budget of Indo-China, which already exhibits a serious deficit and has to call on the mother country for financial aid.

Besides these official expenses, the cost of the entertainment given by various public bodies brings the total up to \$500,000.

### EDITOR'S MAIL.

#### THE INQUEST AT FALCONWOOD

SIR—A good deal has been said recently in your city dailies regarding coroner's inquests. The remarks both of correspondents and of editors show how widespread and deeply implanted in the British virtue of fair play. Yet the much more serious tragedy of the 2nd, inst., in Falconwood, serious that is from the fact that it occurred in a public institution—occurred officially as it were,—has not even received passing notice at the hands of the press fraternity. One paper only gave a short report of the coroner's inquest, the others—The Guardian among them—a bare statement that an inquest had been held and a "verdict" returned according to the facts. Editorially all were discreetly or indiscreetly dumb. Why is this?

Look at the facts briefly. A young woman is suddenly seized with melancholia with very pronounced suicidal tendencies. On the advice of her physician and friends she is taken to Falconwood, the only institution in the Province where expert treatment for this class of diseases is obtainable. Within a few hours of her arrival there, she is given the opportunity, to avoid which she was placed in the institution; under the care of her legal and paid guardians she commits suicide. At the inquest the Medical Superintendent testifies that the nurses were given strict orders to watch her closely; that the rules of the Asylum are that nurses shall see their patients every hour. Is this the Superintendent's ideal of close watching? In the interval allowed by the "rules" the patient finds ample time to gratify the mania that possessed her. And we are not informed that the coroner in his wisdom censured, even mildly, the "rules," the man who made them, or those who executed them. And the press is silent.

Now, Mr. Editor, it will not be news to some at least of your readers that this tragedy was heard of in the community in which the young woman was known, with intense indignation and the silence of the press regarding it, no less so. The fact that it was allowed to occur in the Asylum is, in itself and without any comment as to why or whose fault it was, the strongest condemnation of the "rules" and conduct of the institution. Where are the public to look for safety and to be content for those who have rightly been called "the most unfortunate of God's creatures"? What faith can the friends of the unfortunate have in an institution where a suicide could be committed each other within a few years?

Mr. Editor, the people are justly indignant and shocked over these awful occurrences and will not be satisfied with a slipshod inquest and the recital of "rules." They have a right to know whether the "rules" of the institution are such as will meet the needs, not the wishes of the patients; to know whether patients can with reasonable hope of safety be entrusted to its care; to be given some reasonable explanation of the frequent change of matrons; to know why Miss Owen, who recently resigned her position, or her friends, deemed it necessary to state publicly that she was in no way "responsible for the sad affair of Thursday evening." (See Examiner 4th Inst.) The Attorney General owes it to the people of this Province to institute a thorough investigation of this sad occurrence. The people will not be put off by any white washings. Some one is responsible. Let the responsibility be placed where it belongs; and let the people's sadly shaken confidence in this necessary and costly institution be restored.
