the political ambitions and aspirations of the West.

To the people of the Maritimes this feature of the outlook is not a cheering one. Party leaders are usually not unkind of the constancies and sections they are elected to represent and it is known that all three of the party chiefs are committed to complete and equip the Hudson Bay railway and route which will swallow up many more millions of the people's money. Mr. Meighen alone makes some reserve as to "when the finances of the country may permit." Premier King and Mr. Forke are committed to immediate completion without other conditions.

No one believes that the Hudson Bay Railway can ever be a self-supporting road. It can only be an earner of further railway deficits like the Transcontinental, whose present insignificant traffic it would at best divide. The Maritimes will have to pay, as they have long been paying, higher and higher interest charges and deficits and loss from Maritime ports their present trifling share of grain and cattle exports. If the Senate majority does not interpose on our behalf what hope can we have in our present hard struggle for Maritime right and our rightful place in the sunlight?

It was a loud protest that the Maritime Provinces registered on October 29 against the King Government and against the half-century's callous and cruel neglect which they have suffered. The only real answer the Government has given in the speech from the throne is the promise of more railways in the west and northward toward the arctic icefields, with still more borrowing of money to be loaned at an inevitable loss to Northwest farmers. Years ago it was a loan with which to purchase seed grain out there on which is a successive loans of millions to the Quebec Harbor Commission, not even the interest has been paid. Federal loans anywhere outside of the Maritimes are treated as gifts by the ungrateful recipients.

Power and pelf are more and more working at Ottawa on the old fashioned plan that "they should take who have the power and they should keep who can."



ORANGE MOONS
 Take several oranges and their weight in sugar. Boil the oranges till their bitterness is gone, then take out the pips and the juice, beat the peel very finely in a mortar, and their equal weight of sugar. When mixed in a paste spread them thinly in dishes and set them before a fire to dry, and when dried store them in a tin with paper between them. Turn them from one side to the other while drying, and when stored see that no air gets into them.

PORRIDGE T
 Take 3 gills of fresh milk and boil with 4 ozs. fresh butter in a large saucepan, then stir quickly into it 6 ozs. of oatmeal, wheat meal, or Indian maize. Continue to stir the mixture until the saucepan, which ought to be of earthenware. Season before taking from the fire with chopped parsley and salt, or if sweetness be preferred with sugar and cinnamon.

SYRUP OF ROSES

(As made for Her Royal Highness, Princess Charlotte, the daughter of George the Fourth.)
 Gather one pound of damask rose-leaves with the dew still upon their leaves, and scarcely open to the morning sun, and therefore very fragrant. Put them in an earthen vessel, add a quart of boiling spring water, and cover the vessel closely. Let this remain for 6 hours, not more or less, then run the liquor through a piece of fine muslin cloth, and add to it a pint of the roses, a pound and a half of loaf sugar, then boil over a brisk fire till a good syrup is made, only be careful in the skimming and do not boil for over long—just until the syrup is formed. Then preserve in bottles closely corked. A couple of eggs can be added to clear if desired.

Financial Statement of B Of Nova Scotia

The 1925 Annual Statement of The Bank of Nova Scotia published today shows a good increase in earnings, the profits for the year amounting to \$2,137,920.43, as compared with \$2,110,028.14 in 1924. The usual dividend at the rate of 16% was paid, circulation tax took \$100,000, while \$250,000 was written off Bank Premises and \$75,000 contributed to the Officers' Pension Fund. After these deductions, the amount carried forward in Profit and Loss is \$450,644.59, which is an increase of \$112,820.43 over a year ago.

The balance sheet itself shows an increase of roundly \$10,000,000 in Total Assets. Cash assets are practically unchanged at \$49,770,576.55, while Quick Assets show an increase of \$10,720,856.54 and now amount to \$139,847,965.45. In keeping with the reductions shown by the Banks as a whole, current loans in Canada have declined from the previous year \$6,535,920.37, and now stand at \$70,802,114.02.

Deposits show substantial growth. The non-interest bearing deposits are up from \$33,130,564.21 to \$36,293,619.49, and interest bearing \$146,812,897.51 to \$153,163,219.36. Total deposits stand at \$189,456,838.85 as against \$179,943,461.72.

The liquid position shown by the statement is a strong one. Cash holdings are 18% of liabilities and Quick Assets 65%. It is interesting to note that the statement now published is the ninety-fourth annual report of this old Bank. The annual meeting of the share holders will be held in Halifax on the 27th instant.
