JAMES H. BISHOP, aged 37, of Springfield, Mass., whose wife was formerly Miss Nellie Fitzpatrick of Dalton, fell a few weeks ago, a distance of ninety feet, from a traveller on the new bridge of the Shenectady Railway Company, across the Mohawk river and the Erie canal near Schoharie, and sustained a compound fracture of the skull, from which he died within an hour after being taken to the hospital. Five years ago Mr. Bishop has been employed as superintendent of construction by the Norton Bridge Company, formerly Collins & Norton. He was regarded as a highly trustworthy and responsible man. Mr. Bishop was born in Murray Hill, Prince Edward Island, being absent from his native home for 18 years but visited his native Isle three times within that period. He was in the construction business in Washington, Kan., and other parts of the West before going to Spiggell. He was a member of the Springfield Lodge of Masons. He leaves a widow in Cambridge and his father (Harvey Bishop) Murray River, P. E. Island to whom the heartfelt sympathy of the public is tendered.

EASTERN NOTES—At the date of the last communication two weeks ago, the weather was cold and wintry, a large amount of snow on the ground, the best sleigh roads of the season, and a view all that could be desired. At this date, in the middle of April, the fields are nearly bare, the ice going and gone on our rivers and ponds, the sea ice apparently melted, a gentle westerly breeze blowing, the summer birds singing their welcome songs, and the sea nearly deserted, as the vast snow drifts of winter will make them poor for a season.—The farmers are sowing their wood, some by horse power, some by mule, and the demand for hickory axe handles for the brassy arms of the country Corbets is now extensive, as the curly black birch and beech firewood blocks require an extra amount of strength. Fishing in all branches will be prosecuted more extensively than ever, and the fishermen are preparing their dories, floats, traps and nets in anticipation of the fish that seldom fails. The spirit of enterprise appears to pervade all classes and faith in the future of our country. The daily mail is assured, the telephone in prospect and the Elmira branch Railway eagerly looked for, three projects that will bring us into closer touch with the outside world, necessities and conveniences of modern civilization.—A few wild geese have been shot by Charles Stewart and John Robertson.—Another son was added to John's family on the 13th making ten sons and three daughters all living. Next.—Our saw mills are working to their full capacity. Notwithstanding the severe winter, Mr. Aulay & McNeill and John Bruce have more timber on hand than ever, and his easy friends are glad to see Alex. Scott, Sr., sign's behind his saw, where he has worked for nearly half a century, and can still do a good day's work not withstanding the weight of four score and four winters.

W. A. MURPHY of Southport has placed with R. E. Mutch & Co., agents for the Frost and Wood Co., an efficient Kempt manure spreader which will arrive shortly. This is probably the first machine of its kind to come to the Island and is the first to be used on the south side of the Hillsboro river. The machine will carry manure, lime or fertilizer which is distributed as the spreader is hauled over the ground.
