Winners Give Fine Display In Chalking Up First Rugby Win Of Season

Displaying some of the finest backfield work witnessed here in a long while and with their forwards never giving the opposing backfield a chance to get started the Royal Air Force rugby team Saturday came through with their first victory of the season as they downed the senior St. Dunstan's University squad 12-8 in an exhibition game played on the University gridiron.

The Air Force squad scored two tries in each half, while the winners were converted to offset the converted St. Dunstan's try in the first half and Maurice Smith's penalty boot between the posts halfway through the middle session.

It was by the strongest team the RAF has yet yielded. Fast, heavy and well-balanced the Air boys had a commanding edge in the play all through the game. Stout defensive work by the Saints in the shadows of their own posts lurled back the winners time and again and kept the University team in the running. But although the winners enjoyed a distinct margin in play their inability to get the extra points after converts nearly proved their undoing. Leading 6-0 with only two minutes to go in the first half Saints came through with a spectacular try that was converted to make the score 6-3. And then again in the second session after the winners had pushed over their third try of the game Saints again crept up to within one point as they realized on a penalty kick from twenty yards out the RAF immediately replied with another try to again take a commanding lead but the Saints in a last minute effort again nearly pulled the game out of the fire as McAdam raced 50 yards on what looked like an intercepted pass only to have the play called back for a knock-on within five yards of the touchline.

Don Stewart of the second Prince of Wales rugby team Saturday assumed the hero role as with only three minutes of play remaining he picked up a rolling ball 15 yards out to go over for the only try of the game in an exhibition game against the second High School team of St. Dunstan's. The game was played before the Saints-RAF clash and the two young squads gave a good exhibition. Play was very even all through the encounter with play moving up and down the field very fast. It looked like a scoreless tie until Stewart came through with his game winning effort. LePage's attempt at convert was wide of the mark.

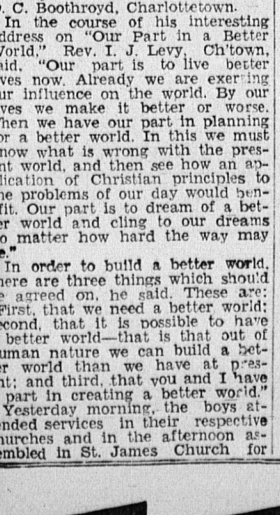

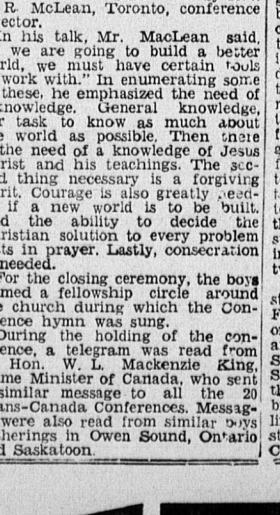
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
