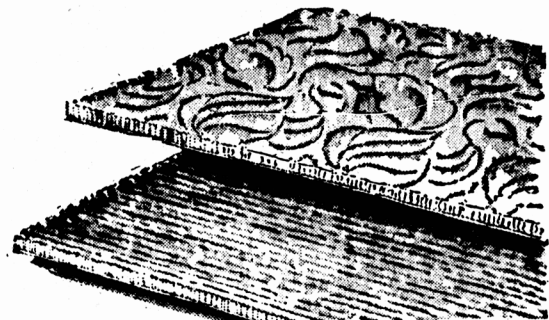

INFANT HEALTH PLAN AUSTRALIAN SUCCESS SYDNEY, Australia, Oct. 25 (CP) - Australians are proud of their country-wide infant welfare system-and with cause. The plan has given the country one of the lowest infant mortality rates in the world. In 1948 the infant death rate (the number of deaths under one year of age per 1,000 births) reached the record low of 27.76. One of the first countries in the world to establish a comprehensive system of infant welfare, Australia now has baby health centres in all her cities and in most country towns. These centres give pre-natal and post-natal advice to mothers, and check the health of babies regularly. No treatment is given, but if there are any symptoms of illness, infants are sent to a doctor or public hospital. In addition to the centres, mobile baby clinics in railway carriages or motor caravans visit many rural areas. Trained nursing sisters who staff them give expert mothercraft advice to women of the outback. There is no charge for any of these services. New South Wales was the first Australian state to set up baby health centres, in 1904. Since then all six states have established similar systems. The basic principles of infant care taught at these centres are the same throughout Australia. Breast-feeding of infants to nine months of age is the standard advice given. Where this is not possible, and when the child is old enough for solid foods, modern diets are suggested. Proof of the effectiveness of the Australian system is the fact that in the last 45 years the infant mortality rate has dropped from 120 in every 1,000 live births to 27.76.
