THE ROAD ACT, 1936

The following Sections of The Road Act are for public information: NO BUILDINGS TO BE ERECTED WITHIN 20 FEET OF INTERSECTION

Section 75 provides that:—"Except in cities and incorporated towns, no person shall, without the permission of the Minister, erect buildings where highways intersect at a distance less than twenty feet from the nearest point on any such highway and any person violating the provisions of this Section shall be liable to a fine of twenty-five dollars to be recovered in the manner provided by Section 52 of the said Act. And if such person fails to remove any such building on the written request of the Minister, the Minister may cause the said building to be removed or demolished at the expense of the owner."

NO BUILDINGS TO BE ERECTED WITHIN 25 FEET OF BOUNDARY OF ROAD

Sections 75A and 75B, added to The Road Act in 1947, provide that:—"Beyond the limits of cities and incorporated towns and within a radius of two miles from such incorporate limits, no person shall, without the permission of the Minister, erect buildings at a distance of less than twenty-five feet from the boundary of any highway or road, nor shall any such buildings be erected at a distance of less than fifty feet from those of the next adjoining owner." 75B. "Any person violating the provisions of Section 75A shall be subject to the same penalties and right of removal or demolition as provided by Section 75 of this Act."

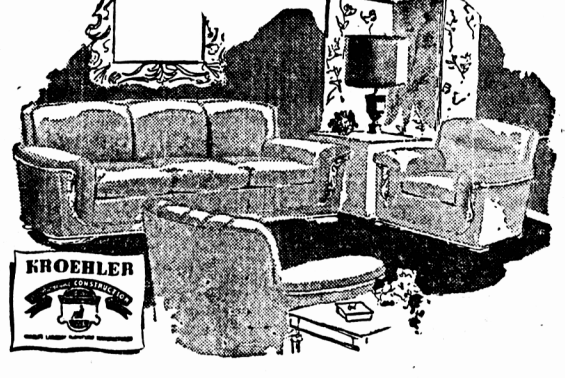
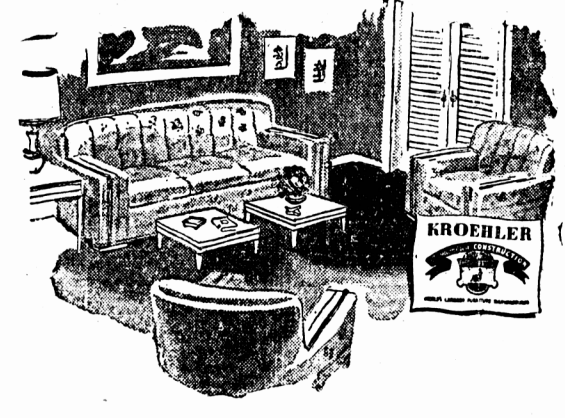
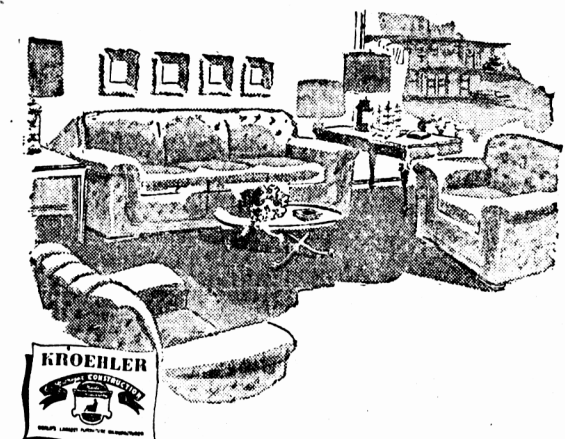
