# BLIND MAN WHO IS MARVEL AT FIGURES

## Sightless He Went through three Colleges and Two Schools Attaining Degrees of Eminent Scholarship and Toured Europe Without the Aid of A Guide.

NEW YORK, Feb. 26.—Stricken blind at eight years of age, Dr. Newell Perry is a marvel at twenty-nine.

Sightless he has gone through three colleges and two schools, attained two degrees for eminent scholarship, toured Europe without a guide or even the use of a walking stick, and is now coaching half a hundred Columbia students in the intricacies of higher mathematics.

Dr. Perry returned from abroad a week ago after a three years sojourn. He went through a course at the University of Munich where he was graduated with the degree of doctor of philosophy. Before his departure from Munich his treatise on higher mathematics in Germany was officially adopted as a text book by the university.

"Expect eventually to become the most eminent mathematician in America," whispered Dr. Perry confidently to a World reporter at his home No 402 West One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street.

"You must feel terribly handicapped without your eyesight," ventured the reporter. "Handicapped? No. Of course not. To be blind from childhood is no handicap. It is a powerful stimulus to a man's ambition. I doubt if my ambition would have become as strong as it is had I retained my eyesight."

Dr. Perry's father was a ranchman in Shasta County, California, and the boy was prone to ramble. In one of these rambles he was poisoned by ivy, accidentally infected his eyes with it, and in a week was stone blind.

The boy's remarkable aptitude for mathematics brought him to the notice of Prof. Wilkinson, Superintendent of the State School for the blind at Berkeley, Cal. There he was taught the rudiments of mental arithmetic. He won a course in the State High School.

Then the real struggle of his life began. Without eyes, but with a marvellously trained memory, he worked out the most intricate problems of calculus, geometry

and trigonometry without even putting his pencil to paper.

At nineteen Dr. Perry entered the University of California, where his reputation was made the day of his admission. In less than a year he had earned enough money by coaching his fellow students to pay the expenses of the remainder of his four year's course.

When he was graduated from the university in 1896, with the degree of Ph. B., the blind student was the acknowledged master of mathematics and was at once appointed to a fellowship. He was quickly advanced to instructor, and during a vacation took a post-graduate course in mathematics at the University of Chicago.

By means of a system of callisthenics and outdoor exercise he kept his health in perfect condition.

He went to Europe in 1900 and took a course at Munich. The "blind marvel," as he was called, astonished the professors, and in his brief course of little more than two years he acquired a mastery of French and German, composed a treatise on mathematics and contributed numerous articles to scientific magazines.

Without the aid of a guide or even a walking stick he toured Italy, France, Germany and Switzerland.

"Of course, many people thought I was rude in brushing against them, but I refrained from explanations so as not to embarrass them with apologies," he said.

"My faculty of hearing is so acutely developed that I can tell, when a person approaches, how ever, light his tread, and know when I am passing an object that is motionless. The echo of my own footsteps is reflected back from a wall or a tree, or a person with a different degree of force."

"Another thing I have learned, which other persons never think of, is to know a person's character by his voice."

"I shall probably remain in New York permanently," concluded Dr. Perry. "I am developing several new theories in mathematics and expect eventually to set forth some interesting theories."

# BRUCE AT NORTH SYDNEY

SYDNEY, March 1.—The steamer Bruce arrived at North Sydney from L'Anse-au-Loup at 8 o'clock this morning. Smashing up the harbor ice, she opened a free passage-way for the Dominion Iron and Steel Company's steamers Cape Breton, Cuban and Thorpe, which had been imprisoned in the harbor for some time, and for whose liberation a lane was being sawed through the ice.

# A THREAT OF DEATH.

SYDNEY, March 2.—About 400 Italians, employees of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company, Sydney, went out on strike today, on the company not giving the men an advance of two cents an hour in their wages. They were being paid fourteen cents an hour and wanted sixteen. The men were congregated this afternoon about the gates of the company, on which they have posted flaring notices that any of their number who returns to work will be killed at once. All the threats, however, are confined among themselves, but the company anticipates no trouble whatever. It is alleged the men are misled by their laudrones.

# LEGITIMATE ADVERTISING.

The rule elsewhere in Canada and in all cities where newspapers are printed is that local notices of concerts, socials and other meetings and entertainments, are treated as advertising, and their insertion in whatever part of the paper they may appear is charged for. Hitherto in Charlottetown the practice has prevailed of inserting gratuitously in the newspapers a considerable class of such notices. The object of these gatherings may be to disseminate information, to provide amusement or to promote some cause or movement; another object is to make or collect money.

It is felt by the managers of the daily newspapers of Charlottetown that all such meetings or entertainments where money receipts are the object aimed at are business enterprises and that all advance notices of such gatherings are in reality advertisements and ought to be paid for as such. They occupy valuable space which could be filled with news of interest or sold to regular advertisers. Quite frequently valuable news of general interest and even regular paid advertising is held out to make room for such notices. They cost in the aggregate a large sum in labor and material. The notices are valuable to those who profit by the increased attendance and receipts which such advertising brings. No merchant would ask or expect a newspaper to advertise his goods or direct people to his place of business without paying for the service.

For these reasons the daily newspapers of Charlottetown decided last week to adopt and adhere in future to the rule which prevails among newspapers elsewhere and make a reasonable charge for notices of all meetings or entertainments, where the object is to raise money. The rate will be five cents a line (of 6 words) for first insertion in either Daily or Weekly, and two and a half cents a line for each continuation. Where such gatherings are for a purely religious or charitable object one half the regular rates will be charged. Minimum price for all such notices fifteen cents.

For black type notices double price will be charged. Births, Marriages and Deaths will be inserted free, but verses accompanying the latter will be charged as above.

# HART'S RIVER CELEBRATION.

TORONTO, Feb. 28.—At a meeting of some of the 2nd C. M. R., it was decided to celebrate the anniversary of the battle of Hart's River by a reunion and dinner on the evening of Tuesday, March 31. It is proposed to effect on this occasion a permanent organization to perpetuate the memories of the regiment and its services in the South Africa.

# NEW SKATING RECORD.
