Situation Lightens In Bank Circles

SOMERVILLE, Mass., Oct. 15. (By the Canadian Press)—The Common wealth today came to the aid of the Somerville Trust Company and through a \$60,000 deposit helped restore confidence, not only in that institution, but in several other Somerville Banks which were simultaneously faced with heavy withdrawals.

State Treasurer Charles F. Hurley, personally handed the money over to Henry C. Falls, treasurer, while a crowd estimated at between 300 and 400 persons looked on.

Hurley reiterated the statements earlier in the day of both Governor Joseph B. Ely and banking commissioner Arthur E. Guy that the trust company was in a sound position. All who insisted upon withdrawing their money were paid promptly.

The \$60,000 deposited by the state represented the full amount—the state was permitted by law to deposit with any bank, or 40 per cent of a bank's capitalisation.

Early in the afternoon the crowd diminished appreciably and many who had withdrawn their accounts were reported to have returned their money.

The situation at the Somerville trust was attributed by state officials to the closing of the nearby Highland Trust Company yesterday which had savings deposits of \$4,100,000 and commercial deposits of \$1,300,000.
