

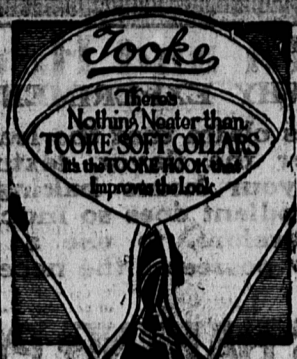

Annual Meeting of The P. E. Island Medical Association

The annual meeting of the P. E. Island Medical Association held at Summerside on Wednesday, was well attended. Dr. J. F. McNeill presided.

Dr. Warburton presented the reports of the registrar, secretary and treasurer of the Medical Society. Drs. Champion and Fleming were appointed auditors and reported all accounts correct.

Officers for the ensuing year were elected as follows: President - Dr. I. J. Yeo, Charlottetown.

Vice-presidents - Dr. McIntyre, Montague, Dr. Murcheson, Clyde River, Dr. Sinclair, Summerside.

Secretary - Dr. Dewar, Charlottetown. Treasurer - Dr. McMillan, Charlottetown.

Exec. Committee - Drs. Tanon, A. A. McDonald, and McGilligan. Auditors - Drs. H. D. Johnson and J. A. McPhee.

The Medical Council was selected as follows: Drs. Carruthers, McMillan, Warburton, Dewar, McNeill, Tanon and Yeo.

A resolution of congratulation to Dr. Alex. McNeill of Summerside, was passed, upon his election to the presidency of the Dominion Medical Council, on the part of Dr. McNeill, seconded by Dr. Ross, who referred in complimentary terms to the honor conferred upon the province in the choice of Dr. McNeill by his election.

In addition to excellent case reports by Drs. McNeill and Ross, the society was favored with excellent papers from Dr. David McKenzie of Montreal, and Dr. W. L. Holman of Pittsburg, recently called to be associate Professor of Bacteriology in Leland Stanford University, and Dr. Royer, a member of the Massachusetts-Halifax Health Commission.

Dr. MacKenzie's paper was entitled "Vesicle Symptoms in Women of Infection" and Dr. Royer on Public Health and the health care. The last named declared there was need of greater activity in public health work in this Province, and in connection a resolution was passed urging upon the government the necessity of having a Provincial Laboratory here, and a committee was appointed to wait on the government in connection with the matter.

Dr. J. F. McNeill in the annual presidential address referred to the loss by death of Dr. Barnes and Dr. Doherty and in the wider field reference was made to the death of Dr. Oster. He also discussed local inspection and urged the necessity of efficient school inspection in this Province.

Falling Off in Boston's Fish Trade

BOSTON, July 14. - Boston's supremacy as the first fishing port of the world is in danger of being lost owing to existing conditions in the fish industry. At the present time more than 20 of the fleet of steam trawlers which have regularly delivered catches of fish here are tied up owing to excessive costs of operation. A comparatively small number of schooners and auxiliary boats are now maintaining the business, the sailing trawler fleet having become greatly reduced in the past few months by rapid and shipwreck in consequence of less fish being received here. In the six-month period from Jan. 1 to July 1 there were nearly 8,000,000 pounds less brought in than in the same time last year.

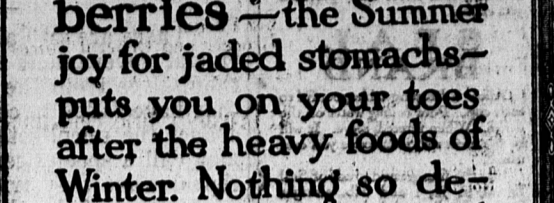

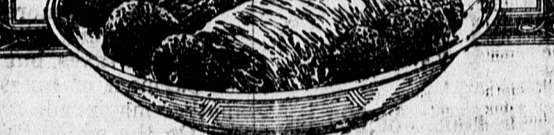
