DISEASE RAGES IN NORTHERN RUSSIA

AMSTERDAM, August 26.—Hunger, typhus and cholera are raging in the northern Russian provinces, says a Petrograd despatch to the Weser Zeitung of Bremen. The population of entire village are dying in great numbers. In some places each person receives equally two pounds of oats weekly and no bread. Railway connections between Moscow and the rest of Russia except the provinces of Tver and Tula have ceased entirely, according to a Moscow despatch to the Dusseldorf Nachrichten. This condition is due in part to the acts of counter revolutionists in blowing up railway bridges and destroying tracks.
