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SKILLETS AND TRIVETS Probably you've heard of them, but without looking them up in the dictionary, do you really know what they are? Like most of your great-grandmother's cooking utensils, they stood on feet.

She could prepare a banquet over an open fire. And she needed tier saucapans up high to get the flame under them and little three-legged stands on which to put her pots and pans.

An old kitchen was a beautiful thing. In winter a roaring fire of hickory would shine on the cranvith the hanging hooks and rows of kettles and pots. Sometimes three sets of andirons would hold up the great logs at different heights. A roast might hang before the blaze. Usually a more or less unwilling child would be set to turn it.

Some of the delicacies seem a bit cannibalistic today. A calf's head was often served. The recipe books say "Many like the eye, which you must cut out with the point of your knife and divide it in two." A housewife must know her cuts and dishes but "if a lady," one was told in 1817, "has never been accustomed, while single, to think of family management, let her not upon that account fear that she cannot attain it."

STEAMING DRY COCOANUT. When using dry cocoanut with cake frosting, try steaming the cocoanut first and you will be pleased with the result. Before putting the cocoanut over the steam, place same in a clean, white cloth or table napkin. In this way none of it is wasted.

DON'T CHILL BANANAS. Bananas should not be put into a refrigerator. They should never be allowed to get colder than sixty degrees. A chill turns bananas black and prevents proper ripening.
