FRENCH AND BRITISH ORGANIZING POLES

Polish army is stiffening under new leadership. Polish armistice delegates leave for Warsaw.

PARIS, July 31.—Polish line of battle is stiffening as reorganization of the army progresses under guidance of French and British officers, according to Foreign Office advices today.

Polish Army is Disintegrating. BERLIN, July 31.—The Polish northern army has been cut off near Augustovo and is disintegrating, according to reports received today from east Russia.

Armistice Negotiations begin today. WARSAW, July 31.—Armistice negotiations between Poles and Bolsheviks begin today.

Enthusiastic Crowd Welcomes Lipton. NEW YORK, July 30.—Sir Thomas Lipton, owner of Shamrock IV, unsuccessful challenger for the America's Cup, had difficulty going aboard his own yacht to night, when an enthusiastic crowd of more than three thousand persons who had gathered at a Hudson River pier where the craft was moored, barred his way.

LONDON, July 31.—A quick passage of the new Irish bill designed to empower the authorities to suppress disorders in that country, was promised by Premier Lloyd George in conference with parliamentary leaders, according to the official text of the conference available today.

Vice Admiral Napier Dead. HAMILTON, Bermuda, July 30.—Vice-Admiral Sir Trevelyan D. W. Napier, Commander-in-Chief of the British North American and West Indies Naval Station, died at 2:30 o'clock this morning at the Admiralty House here.

NEW YORK, July 29.—The suggestion has been made in yachting circles that seeing Sir Thomas Lipton has left an opportunity for someone else to challenge for the America's cup, it would be a highly popular move for the Prince of Wales to enter the lists and sail a yacht against the New York Yacht Club next year.

QUEBEC, July 31.—August Levoisier, a sailor on board the French schooner Marmoutier, was held as criminally responsible for the death of Jean Vergos, chief engineer of the ship, by the Coroner's jury today and Maurice Hollinger, another member of the crew was exonerated from all blame.
