\$15,000,000 RAIL ORDER

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
OTTAWA, Aug. 21.—With difficulties between the government and the two railways fairly well adjusted, approval is expected to be given at tomorrow's meeting of the Cabinet Council to orders amounting to \$15,000,000 for purchases of new car equipment by the Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Railways.

It was understood approximate orders as follows would be included: Canadian Car and Foundry Co. Montreal, \$4,000,000; National Steel Car Co., Hamilton \$3,000,000 and Eastern Car Co., Trenton, N. S., \$2,000,000.

The public works program bill passed at the last session of parliament authorized the government to guarantee equipment securities of the two railways in the amount of \$15,000,000, and it is under this measure approval of the purchase order is proposed.

Refuses To Bear Arms, Denied U.S. Citizenship

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
BOSTON, Aug. 21.—A Cornish N.Y. minister's wife, was denied United States citizenship today because she refused to subscribe to the stipulation that she bears arms for the United States in time of war.

Mrs. Gertrude Annas, 35, a British subject, told Federal Judge Hugh D. McLellan, when questioned on that phase of the application, "if that's the only way I can become a citizen, then I don't want to do it."

Judge McLellan said he based his adverse ruling on a United States Supreme Court decision in the case of Professor Douglas C. MacIntosh, a Canadian, and Miss Marie Bianco, also Canadian, in 1921 in this case, both applicants refused to bear arms, on grounds of conscientious objections.

Mrs. Annas told the Court she was the daughter of Rev. James L. Lockhead, a former missionary in Edinburgh, Scotland. Her whole youth, she said, had been "overshadowed by war and the horror of war."

Some time before Christmas of 1869 a meeting (or meetings) of the Tyne Valley section of the historic Richmond Bay Congregation was held in Tyne Valley to plan the erection there of a suitable place of worship.

Tenders were received and that of James Barclay was accepted, and an agreement entered into for the building of such a place of

worship for the sum of \$250 (\$1.155 at par). The building committee consisted of the following: James MacArthur, Donald MacLean, Peter Miller and Samuel MacArthur.

In the summer of 1871 the first tea party was held under the direction of the board of managers or "managing committee" as follows: Samuel MacArthur, John Mollison, William MacLean, James Ramsay and Donald MacArthur.

The proceeds amounted to \$91 (\$443).

On June 22, 1872, Mr. John Mollison was appointed secretary, which office he held for over four years, and later by Mr. Samuel MacArthur for about 12 years when the manse was built.

In 1872 the congregation was being supplied since the resignation of Rev. Mr. Cumming, by Rev. Mr. Barrett. At this meeting on June 22, 1872, a discussion took place on the separation of Tyne Valley from Lot 14. This did not materialize until later.

On April 10, 1873, a congregational meeting heard the following financial report for the year 1871:

The seating was at that time discussed and Mr. John Mollison was commissioned to draw plans for pulpit and seats after the style and finish of Summerside Presbyterian Church.

On Sept. 26, 1874, it was learned that Mr. W. Locke had contracted to build the seats as per plan and give them three coats of paint all for \$200. The work was completed by the last of October, 1874. Rev. Mr. Crawford was present, having been inducted Sept. 8, 1874. A motion passed to this effect, "that we as a section would adopt the system of obtaining pastor's salary by giving upon the first day of the week as God has prospered us."

Further, two ladies were appointed to canvass the congregation for missions (Misses Elizabeth Ramsay and M. A. MacLean). The question of a manse was discussed and the missionary collectors were to canvass for manse fund as well as at this time Sabbath collections which are frequently referred to in minutes as "Cent Collection Fund" was received on a plate in the vestry. But after Nov. 2, 1874 by collection ladies taken round by the managers at the close of the service.

On June 27, 1875, it was agreed to sell the seats at public auction. On Sept. 3, 1875, it was decided to sell by auction the heating and lighting of the church, the contract to begin Oct. 1, 1875. James MacArthur agreed to do it for \$17.00.

The auction of seats took place on Wednesday, Nov. 3, 1875.

By May 4, 1876 an acre of ground was bought for a burying ground. In the autumn of 1883 Tyne Valley and Lot 14, disjoined, the following resolution from Sheep River: "This section in sympathy and will aid in erection of manse."

Ministers of Tyne Valley: Mr. Murray, Mr. Cumming, Mr. Crawford, Mr. Carr, Mr. Corbett, Mr. McKeanie, Mr. W. McLeod, Wm. C. Murdoch, Roland Davidson, Mr. J. Valentine, Mr. R. G. Sinclair, Thos. Wilson, W. R. Auld, Vance McLean, A. Brown, E. Robertson, and the present minister, Rev. Mr. White.

It was interesting to note that in the minutes referring to the public auction of seats that the price paid was from ten to thirty dollars per year. Some seats were unsold for the use of aged people and some for the choir. S.

History of the Church

From the minutes which had been so carefully preserved by Mr. Mollison, Rev. Mr. White then read a most interesting account of the building of the Church and other things in connection with the early Presbyterians of Tyne Valley.

Some time before Christmas of 1869 a meeting (or meetings) of the Tyne Valley section of the historic Richmond Bay Congregation was held in Tyne Valley to plan the erection there of a suitable place of worship.

Tenders were received and that of James Barclay was accepted, and an agreement entered into for the building of such a place of

as God has prospered us."

The question of a manse was discussed and the missionary collectors were to canvass for manse fund as well as at this time Sabbath collections which are frequently referred to in minutes as "Cent Collection Fund" was received on a plate in the vestry. On June 27, 1875, it was agreed to sell the seats at public auction. On Sept. 3, 1875, it was decided to sell by auction the heating and lighting of the church, the contract to begin Oct. 1, 1875. James MacArthur agreed to do it for \$17.00.

The auction of seats took place on Wednesday, Nov. 3, 1875.

By May 4, 1876 an acre of ground was bought for a burying ground. In the autumn of 1883 Tyne Valley and Lot 14, disjoined, the following resolution from Sheep River: "This section in sympathy and will aid in erection of manse."
