Women Make Fortunes - Now that Mrs. Jacob Baur, one of the leading real estate business women of the United States, has retired, leaves Mrs. Edith Rockefeller McCormick pretty much at the head of the parade in that field.

These two women have done much to consolidate the theory that a woman can make her place in business and society for members of her sex. They both have dealt on an equal footing with men and both have found success in a big way.

While Mrs. Baur has found millions in real estate, she has found time to be a factor in local politics and a recognized personage in Chicago society.

Mrs. McCormick probably has the edge over her as a political power, but Mrs. Baur during the April primaries as a candidate for Congress was Congressman Fred Britton's considerable worry. She plans in the future to extend her activities in that direction.

Mrs. Baur's rise to high place in business, politics and society is to a story-book kind, but she attributes it to a definite set of rules. To succeed, she says, a woman must have confidence, wide knowledge, ability to execute knowledge acquired, ability to think, a reserve of perseverance, and a patience, and ability to concentrate on one thing at a time.

Following these rules, Mrs. Baur came to Chicago from a small town in Iowa as a stenographer, found a man, she served as secretary to three politicians and became known as Chicago's assistant postmaster.

Then she married Jacob Baur, head of the Liquid Carbonic Company. On his death she took a leading position in the company and under her management it grew to large proportions. Her income was estimated at over \$400,000 a year.

Now she has sold out her interest in the company, she will retire from business, that required attention to all of business, as politician and social leader, though, the field is wide. She has served as vice-chairman of the ways and means committee of the National Republican Convention and is due to step out in other ways.

Canada's Fruit

Fruit exported from Canada last year had a value of \$8,385,500, which is about the average value of the annual exports for the past three years.

Apples in a natural state contributed about three-fourths of this total, namely, 1,388,493 barrels, worth \$2,529,136. Of these exports of apples last year 1,296,000 barrels, worth \$5,743,000 went to Great Britain, and the remainder to the United States, Bermuda, British South Africa, China, Denmark, Germany, Newfoundland, New Zealand, and Scandinavia.

The annual production of apples in Canada ranges from 2,700,000 to 3,000,000 barrels. The average export is about 1,500,000 barrels a year.

The possibilities of apple production in Canada have scarcely been touched, for the present, but more intensively cultivated but could also be developed with the United Kingdom, the Dominion for apple production, a phase of agriculture in which settlers from the British Isles have shown a keen interest and engaged in so extensively.

The official board organized to direct the marketing of Empire products in Great Britain has been appointed with L. C. J. C. Amery, Secretary of State for the Dominions, as chairman. Seven members will sit on the Board as representatives of the British Isles while the Dominions and the Colonies will have one member each. W. A. Wilson, agricultural product representative for Canada in the United Kingdom, has been appointed Canadian member of the Board.

WIRELESS FOR MOUNTAINERS. In view of the difficulty of fitting refuge huts for mountaineers with the telephone, says a writer in the Electrical Review, experiments have been carried out during the past three years with wireless. The Radio Club de France has now decided to equip some of the more generally frequented refuges with transmitting as well as receiving sets.

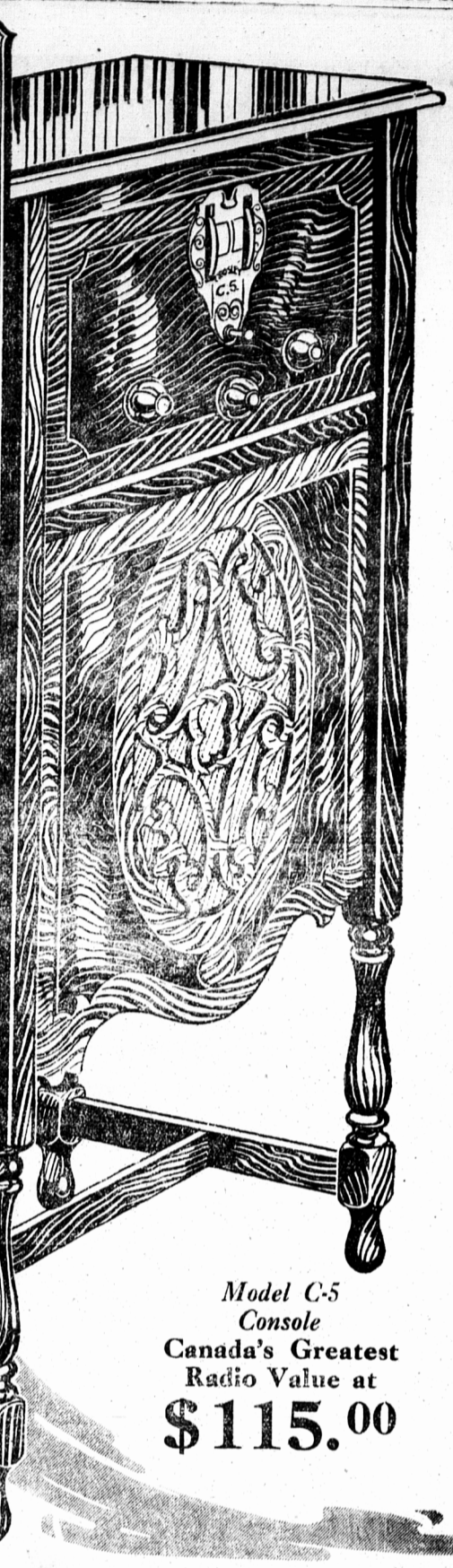
