—FARMERS INSTITUTE.—The regular meeting of the Mont Carmel Farmer's Institute took place on Jan. 3rd 1916. The ordinary routine having been despatched, the question of drainage was dealt with in all its phases. The subject was particularly interesting as the "Demonstration field" in the vicinity of this section. In view of the losses sustained by the farmers for the last three years, it is urgent that some means be adapted to protect the farmers from further losses. For the last fifteen years the farmers have applied all their resources to better their conditions, but notwithstanding all their efforts, and all the knowledge imparted by the very able and painstaking lectures many have been obliged to give up farming on account of the wet condition of the land. In an ordinary dry season, there is no better land to be found, easily tilled and relative free from bad weeds. Immense deposits of mud containing a great quantity of vegetable matter is available. A gain the sea furnishes its quota of kelp and seaweeds, so that conditions being equal, this section of the country ought to be thriving, but unfortunately the opposite is the case. During the course of the discussion several farmers who visited the "Demonstration Field" testified as to the improved condition of the land compared to others. Again it was pointed out, and a resolution to that effect was unanimously adopted, that it would be to the interest of the farmers especially in Prince County that the sums of money expended or granted for exhibition should be devoted towards helping the farmers to drain their land or otherwise that the money provided for exhibition be loaned to the farmers at a certain interest for so many years. Without question, this move would be to the great advantage of the whole province as it would tend to keep the young men at home, and thereby increase the assets of this province. It is hoped to see other institutes take up the question of drainage and also discuss the question of exhibition grants.

—NEW TELEPHONE BOX.—The people in the neighbourhood of Mr. James S. Callant, Mr. Carmel are elated at the thought of having a new telephone box that will be installed in Mr. Gallant's residence in the near future. The line in connection with this box was bought by residents from the Company, a step which will greatly benefit this section of the township.

Song, "La Fleur du Souvenir." 2, French reader, intermediate and Primary. Recitation, "Le petit doigt de manan." Latin. Recitation, "A Woman's War Cry." 2, English readers. (Intermediate). Primer. 3, French reader (senior). Recitation, "What we Do in the Morning." History and Geography. English. Primer. 3, English reader, intermediate. Recitation, "Le Petit Alsacien." 1, French reader. Recitation "Fio's Letter." Besides the foregoing subjects Arithmetic and other branches were examined, and all the thorough satisfaction of the ratepayers and trustees. After the program had been exhausted, prizes were distributed especially in connection with the school grades and home projects. 26 in all had responded to the teachers wishes in regards to home plots. All of whom were remunerated in order of merit as laid down by the inspector. After a few brief remarks passed by Rev. P. P. Arsenault and others towards the welfare of the school, the National Anthem was sung and parent and pupils returned home the latter having been granted leave of absence for a weeks holidays.

**A KHAKI CLUB FOR SUMMERSIDE**

Since the advent of the soldiers to Summerside the necessity of a Club Room or meeting place for amusement as well as for reading and writing has been felt. The Y. M. C. A. sometime ago, was placed at their disposal but the rooms proved altogether too small to accommodate their growing numbers.

Accordingly a short time ago, on the invitation of Rev. J. G. McLean, Y. G. Parish Priest of St. Paul's Parish, Summerside, the parishioners met and decided to hand over St. Paul's Society Hall to the Town to be used as a club room for the soldiers.

On Monday evening the 10th instant, the soldiers assembled in the hall and were met by Mayor Saunders the Town Council, Rev. Father McLean and a number of the prominent citizens. The Mayor taking the chair the assemblage arose and sang the National Anthem after which Rev. Father McLean in a brief address, on behalf of St. Paul's Parish, handed the hall over to the Mayor. In so doing he briefly outlined the incidents that lead to the present function and especially touched on the fact that the catholic societies had generously given up their beautiful hall and gone to very inferior quarters and that by so doing had shown that they were ready to do their bit for the Empire's sake.

The Mayor then accepted, on behalf of the citizens for the benefit of the soldiers, the beautiful hall and expressed the thanks of the assemblage for the unselfish gift. He said he was certain the soldiers would appreciate such a nice meeting place and that they would in future, as in the past, show by their conduct that they were true soldiers of the King.

The Mayor then appointed the following committee to take charge of the hall, namely:—Mr. Roy Holman; Hon. A. E. Arsenault; Mr. Johnston Lidstone; Mr. J. J. McNally; Mr. Creel McArthur; Mr. Heath Strong; Mr. Leonard McNeill; Mr. Fidele Perry; Mr. Hillard Muttart and Councilor Joseph J. Gaudet.

The committee, together with the Mayor as chairman, will in the future look after the comfort of the soldiers and supply them with reading and writing material, with games and amusements of different kinds.

After remarks of appreciation from leading citizens, a musical programme was carried out and the meeting was brought to a close by singing the National Anthem.

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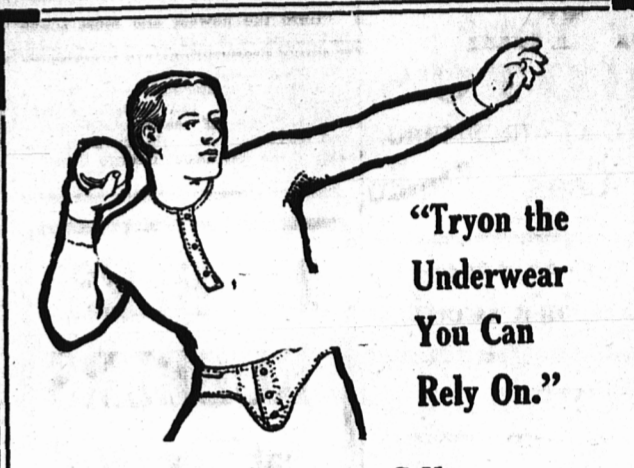
