REFUSED INFORMATION

Mr. Ernst said that the house was being refused information as to whether the \$2,500,000 was an instalment or whether it represented the entire amount which the government was going to pay by way of reparations.

There was in the consolidated revenue fund last year, a sum approximating \$10,800,000 which had been received from Germany by way of reparations.

OVER SIX MILLION

The report of James Friel, the reparations commissioner, had been filed in the House last session. It showed there were 1,600 entitled to an amount of \$4,246,000.

FOR FISHERMEN

He instanced the case of fishing vessels, whose crews often took their wages in shares of the catch. There were times when these fishing boats were sunk by submarines with their full catches aboard.
