### THE EXHIBITION.

With appetites stimulated by the preliminary County Fairs in Kings' and Queen's Counties, the general public of this Province, the visitors from abroad and a host of eager exhibitors will greet the opening of the Inter- Maritime Exhibition which opens in Charlottetown today. The other shows and races in the Maritime Provinces are over. This is the last and may be confidently hoped to be the best of the season. Charlottetown never yet gave a poor exhibition, and is not likely now to do so for the first time.

The management is capable and experienced; there are excellent buildings for the main display and for the live stock; there are a goodly number of exhibitors in all departments and of entries for the races, which promise to be keenly contested, and there are special attractions of promising interest. The opening will be made this afternoon with due eclat by His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, with Premier Peters, Judge Fitzgerald and other speakers, whom it is always a privilege to hear. Competent and fair-minded judges give assurance that the best will win, so far as the human judgment can determine.

The one element of uncertainty is the weather, and that has always to be faced. At this writing the promise for the opening day is not altogether bright, but this will not greatly matter if the succeeding days turn out fine, as we hope they may. The very fact that so much rain has fallen during the past few weeks may give hope that it is pretty nearly all down. The new moon, which came in yesterday, may bring with it a favorable change. We can only hope that all concerned may see it over the right shoulder with money in both pockets, and that as the nights grow brighter under Luna's expanding crescent, the days may become cloudless, the air serene, and the Exhibition an increasing success from day to day.

So far we have seen no attempt to challenge the accuracy of the official figures or the reasonableness of the estimates and arguments based thereon. We acknowledge indebtedness to Capt. 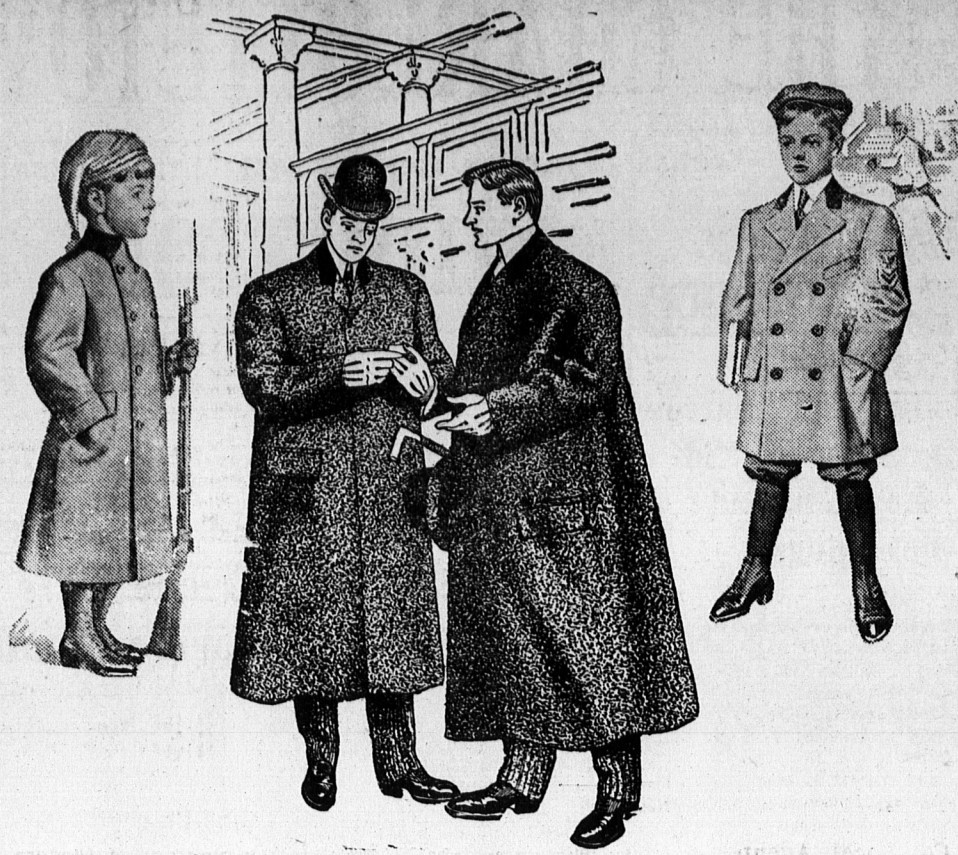
