TORONTO SELLS BOND ISSUE TO SYNDICATE

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 13.—Hon. E. A. Dunlop, Provincial Treasurer, announced today that the Province of Ontario at noon completed the sale of a \$30,000,000, 40 year, four and a half percent installment bond issue to a syndicate headed by National City Co. New York at a price of 98.66 which represents a cost basis of 4.993 per cent. The syndicate was composed of the National City Co. Dillon Read and Co., Guaranties Co. of New York, Wood Gundy and Co. Ltd., A. E. Ames and Co. Ltd., Securities Corp. Ltd. The bidding was very keen said Mr. Dunlop. Two other syndicates entered.

Willingdon's Message

I leave you with the profound conviction that the basic condition of Canada is absolutely sound, declares His Excellency after making a brief reference to the present depressed conditions, and he expressed the certainty that difficulties confronting the Canadian people will soon be overcome and that the Dominion will

VEST-POCKET DOMINION

LONDON, Jan. 13.—"A vest pocket size self-governing Dominion" was the description applied to Lundy Island, in the mouth of the Bristol Channel by Martin Coles Harman, owner of the Island, when he appeared to the court of Kings Bench, unsuccessfully, today against a former decision that it was illegal for him to issue his own coinage for the Island. Harman had asserted he possesses virtually sovereign rights over the forty-five inhabitants of the island and he had issued coins bearing the likeness of a bird, the puffin, which might be called Lundy's "national bird". A Devonshire Magistrate however fined him \$25 for a breach of the coinage act.

Ownership Of Schooner Established

MONCTON, N. B., Jan. 13.—The ownership of the small schooner which was picked up in the Northumberland Strait yesterday by the Car Ferry, Prince Edward Island, a drift, nameless and without a crew, was established this morning. The vessel is the property of a man named Lantegne of Negau, Northumberland County, N. B., and was washed away from its moorings by the recent storm and high tides in that locality. It was traced through communication with consignees whose names appeared on packages in the vessel. Mr. Lantegne the owner, could not be communicated with as he was away from his home.

Work For All In Canada, Is Aim

Of The Government—Over 155,000 Men In Seven Provinces Of Dominion Secured Work As Result Of Bennett Relief Measures.

MONTREAL, Que., Jan. 13.—In December 1930, over 155,000 men in seven of the nine provinces of Canada secured work as a result of the relief measures adopted at the special session of Parliament called by Premier Bennett, Senator Gideon Robertson, Minister of Labor, said at the first meeting of the R. B. Bennett Conservative Association here last night. He pointed out that two more provinces have yet to report on the number of men employed. Senator Robertson declared that work for all in Canada was the aim of the Government, and immigration would not be encouraged until all in the country were working and there was room for outsiders. He stated that had immigration been stopped earlier the problems relating to the unemployed today would have been less.

FERGUSON WILL SAIL FEB. 23

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 13.—Hon. G. Howard Ferguson, Canadian High Commissioner in London will sail from Saint John, N. B., on January 23 aboard the steamer Montcalm to take over his official duties. Announcement of the date of sailing was made by the former Ontario Premier on his arrival from Toronto today to confer with Rt. Hon. R. B. Bennett, Prime Minister.

Chinese Ask Advice On Reconstruction

GENEVA, Jan. 13.—The Chinese Government requested the League of Nations today to send Sir Arthur Salter, director of the secretariat's economic and financial section and Robert Haas, director of its transit section to Nankin, to give the Nationalists Government their advice on the reconstruction of China. The question will come before the coming session of the Council on Jan. 18, but its acceptance is indicated by the soundings which preceded the formal invitation. Since Dr. Louis Rauchman director of the League's health organization is already in China by invitation, advising on the reorganization of the Chinese health service, the present move would bring to China the directors of all three of the principal technical sections of the League Secretariat. This constitutes by far the greatest program of reconstruction the League has ever been asked to embark on.

Novel Offer To Farmers

Reported That The Tradewind Fell Into Ocean

Radiogram From Steamer President Garfield, Says Intercepted Message From San Miguel Radio Station, Tells Fate Of Daring Flyers.

NEW YORK, Jan. 13.—The Mackay Radio Corporation today received a radiogram from the steamer President Garfield, which intercepted a message from the San Miguel Radio station, saying it understood the aeroplane Tradewind had fallen in the sea about twenty miles from Mosteiros Point, St. Michaels Island. The Tradewind, carrying Capt. William McLaren and Mrs. Beryl Hart had been hitherto unreported, while on a flight from Bermuda to the Azores Islands, which started Saturday at Hamilton. The message from the San Miguel station said, "Understand aeroplane fell in the sea about twenty miles from Mosteiros Point, St. Michaels Island. All ships have been advised to keep a lookout."

FAMILIES OF WELSH MINERS IN DISTRESS

No Adequate Funds Are Available From The Union And The Govt. Is Not Granting Dole.

CARDIFF, Wales, Jan. 13.—Relief canteens are beginning to dot the Welsh valleys where the weekly pay envelope of 150,000 miners have been missing two pay days now, because of the coal strike.

There have been a flood of applications for assistance from women and children and families which are in distress. No adequate funds are available to aid the men during the stoppage, and unless decisions in the pending test cases differ from precedent they will not be granted a dole.

It is their contention that they are entitled to this recompense on the ground that the owners are attempting to keep them at work on illegal terms. Shopkeepers met over his week end and decided that due to the precarious condition it would be impossible for them to extend over a week's credit for supplies.

TAKING OVER OF CANADA'S WHEAT CROP

By Govt., With Legal Tender Issued In Payment That Would Be Redeemable Only In Dominion, Is Proposed.

EDMONTON, Alta., Jan. 13.—Taking over of Canada's entire wheat crop by the Dominion Government, with legal tender issued in payment that would be redeemable only in the Dominion, is the proposal to be placed before the United Farmers of Alberta convention in Calgary, January 20 to 23. The suggestion is embodied in a resolution passed by a mass meeting of one hundred and fifty farmers of the Winterburn district, the text of which reads: Whereas, owing to our inability to market our Canadian wheat crop, a situation has arisen which threatens to cripple or destroy the whole business structure of Canada, therefore be it resolved that we request the Federal Government to issue wheat certificates or dollars redeemable in wheat and receivable in taxes. And be it further resolved that we request the Federal Government to take over the 1930 wheat crop at a price approximating the cost of production and pay the producers for same in wheat certificates. In case the domestic dollars issued in payment for grain find their way out of Canada, sponsors of the resolution suggested these be made redeemable only in wheat.

The creation of a National Bank also received favor as a permanent solution of farmers problems, it being urged that some sort of credit must be provided at approximately the cost of service.
