The Re-Establishment Probe

The Royal Commission appointed at the last session of Parliament to investigate G. W. V. A. charges against the Board of Pension Commissioners and to investigate the need for further re-establishment measures for ex-soldiers, is losing no time in undertaking the second phase of its task. In response to representations by C. G. MacNeill, Dominion Secretary, G. W. V. A., on behalf of the Dominion Veterans' Alliance, the Commission has agreed to have a representative of the veterans travel with the personnel in order to line up the evidence at the various points visited. It was also due to representations from the veterans that the Commission decided to visit one centre in each province. Prince Edward Island, for example, Stittings will be held at Halifax, St. John, Montreal, Toronto, Winnipeg, Regina, Calgary and Vancouver. It is probably significant that the first matter listed in the Commission's programme is to receive suggestions as to any improvements in the methods whereby ex-servicemen may apply for pensions and to ascertain also in submitting appeals from pension decisions. The second function will be investigation of the re-establishment requirements of discharged handicapped men, and making provision for those who may be considered permanently as "problem" cases. Evidence as to the extent and nature of existing re-establishment departments, will comprise the third phase, and suggestions for the disposal of canteen funds the fourth. The work of the Commission is to commence on or before January 15th and it is hoped to complete the tour of the Dominion in time to report on the various matters to the House of Commons, which, it

is anticipated, will be in session at the time. NAMED THE G. W. V. A. The retirement of R. P. Maxwell from the Dominion presidency of the Great War Veterans' Association of Canada, recalls the fact that he was the originator of the name of the Association. Shortly after Mr. Maxwell returned to Winnipeg early in 1916, following his recovery from serious wounds received at the Second Battle of Ypres, the question of a returned soldiers' organization was mooted. The first steps were taken towards the close of 1916 and the name suggested by Mr. Maxwell and adopted was the Winnipeg Great War Veterans' Association. Mr. Maxwell was elected vice-president and a few months later became president. When the national conference of veterans was called in April, 1917, at Winnipeg, the name of the local organization was selected for the amalgamated body of all local veterans' organizations the words "of Canada" being added. Mr. Maxwell is the proud possessor of one of the first badges of the association—a round button with a figure of Britannia crowning a warrior with a laurel wreath of victory. In view of the stirring events before victory was finally achieved the badge is symbolic of the unwavering confidence of the Canadian troops that victory must finally come.

LOST TRAILS

Do veterans as a group disappear more easily than other people? The Information Department of the Dominion Command G. W. V. A. at Ottawa has been asking this question during recent weeks. During 1920 and 1921 enquiries concerning veterans who had disappeared following demobilization were steadily becoming fewer and far between. Recently the list has again started to mount up. Among the names of those of whom information is now sought are: Thomas McCourt, formerly 38th Battalion; T. B. Raynes formerly 172nd Battalion; Roscoe Kline, formerly 175th Battalion Machine Gun; Ham R. Gordon, formerly 26th Battalion; J. B. Masterton, discharged at Vancouver; W. E. Gorrie, formerly 63rd Battalion and C. A. D. C.; William C. McGillivray, alias William A. Cameron, formerly C. F. A.; James George Bradbury, formerly 20th Kings Royal Rifle Corps; Herbert Ferguson, 249th Battalion.

EAT HERRINGS FOR HEALTH

In Lewis and other islands of the Hebrides the people live in what are called "black houses," dark, dingy, dirty hovels without windows or chimneys, shared with domestic animals, models indeed of every sanitary disadvantage, and from these hovels the babies are seldom taken out of doors and exposed to sunlight until they can walk. And yet the infant death rate in these islands is exceedingly low, being 40 per 1,000 as compared with 100 in the large towns, while rickets and decayed teeth are practically unknown. It is to the food of the Hebrides that their vigorous health and happy immunities must be ascribed. The food consists of herring, oatmeal and eggs, the liver largely—oatmeal and eggs, the liver of the fish being a favorite delicacy when mixed with oatmeal and milk and cooked in cods' heads.

A HANDY INCINERATOR

An incinerator in which to burn refuse should be in every home, as it lessens the danger of fire and prevents burning papers from being scattered by the wind. When it is full it is carried out away from the buildings and set on fire. A piece of small mesh chicken wire about three feet high and ten feet long will do for the cylinder part reinforced by pieces of heavy wire lashed to the top and bottom and four pieces up and down the sides. Two pieces three feet square will form the top and bottom and maybe fastened to heavy wire circles and the bottom fastened to the cylinder all around. The top one, or lid, can be hinged to one side and a piece of loose wire placed on the side to fasten it down when the refuse is being burned.
