Britons To Get Beer Despite Rations Cutting

LONDON, May 20 (CP)—Britons will continue to get their beer despite more severe food rationing made necessary by the Nazi conquest of Holland and Belgium.

Alternative sources of supply will be tapped, he said, to make up for butter, eggs and milk formerly received from territories overrun by the Germans.

An organization has been perfected to ensure food deliveries to all parts of the United Kingdom despite emergencies which may arise from air raids, he said.

Butter will be brought from Eire if the Irish farmers can complete a commercial basis with New Zealand. New sources must be found for eggs and condensed milk. Sugar supplies to manufacturers have already been cut, he noted, and will be cut still more, except that manufacturers already reduced to 40 per cent or less of their normal supplies will not be further restricted.

YESTERDAY'S RESULTS

NEW YORK, May 20 (AP)—The Bees let loose in two big innings today—a five-run third and a six-run fourth—as they coasted to a 13-4 victory over the National League leaders, Cincinnati Reds at Boston.

Aided by homers by Al Lopez and Carvell Rowell, each coming with two men on base, pitcher Dick Erickson went the route for the Bees, giving up 11 hits.

The Phillies, putting in a ninth-inning rally, erased a six-run deficit and hung up their second consecutive triumph over Pittsburgh 8-7 at Philadelphia. It was the third straight for Philadelphia.

Four Pirate hurlers worked in the wild ninth.

Manager Frankie Frisch, and Bob Elliott, of the Pirates and Joe Mauer, of the Phils, were banished from the game for disputing decisions.

Chuck Klein hit his fourth homer of the year.

The Dodgers absorbed their third straight defeat 6-4 at Brooklyn from Chicago Cubs, who collected 13 hits from six pitchers.

Bill Lee shut out Brooklyn for five innings and got credit for the victory although he was knocked out of the box in the sixth. Babe Phelps hit a homer with two on.

At Todd homered with none on.

At New York Cliff Melton, Giant veteran southpaw, shut out St. Louis Cardinals 6-0 on six hits for his fourth victory against one defeat.

His battery mate, Harry Danning, batted in five runs with a homer and a triple. The other tally was a home run in the fifth inning by Melton.

At St. Louis, the Cardinals won their first home game of the season and emerged from the cellar by squeezing out a 3-2 victory at Chicago over Washington Senators. The loss dropped the Senators into fifth place.

Johnny Rigney pitched two-hit ball for seven innings and then was battered from the mound in the eighth by Washington's four-run spurge. Clint Brown finished the game.

The Sox scored all their runs in the first three innings.

Four home runs in as many innings, plus a four-run outburst in the fifth gave Philadelphia Athletics an 8-4 victory over the Browns at St. Louis. The triumph sent the Mackmen into fourth place.

The A's made only three hits in the first four innings but each was a home run. Ben Johnson clouted his seventh in the fifth.

Wally Piatek got his fourth, and Frank Hayes hit his fourth, and later his fifth.

The drive for quickened war production opened by the new government of Prime Minister Churchill gained momentum with a nationwide response of thousands of garage hands to an appeal by the new minister of aircraft production, Lord Beaverbrook, for help in the aircraft industry.

NEW YORK, May 20 (AP)—Frank (Pinky) Higgins hit three home runs in successive trips to the plate in seven runs and enabled the Tigers to beat the American League-leading Boston Red Sox 10-7 today at Detroit.

Lynwood (Schoolboy) Rowe, who relieved Tommy Bridges, received credit for Detroit's win.

Jimmy Foxx hit his 10th homer with the bases loaded.

Al Smith, a southpaw pitcher resurrected from the minors this spring by the Indians, led New York Yankees to three hits as Cleveland humiliated the world champions 10-2, and sent them back into the cellar. The game was at Cleveland.

Smith shut out the Yankees on one hit for eight innings, but in the ninth Bill Knickerbocker singled, Joe Dmazio walked and Bill Dickey doubled for two runs.

Jeff Heath led the Cleveland assault with two home runs. Altogether the Indians got 17 hits.

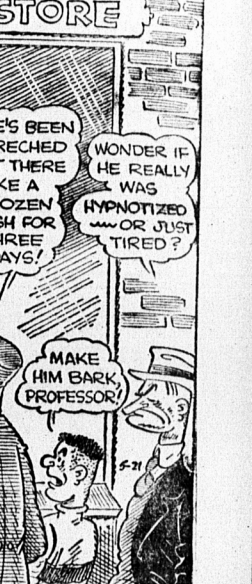
