**THE BRITISH CENSUS.**

The British census has now been tabulated and the total results given to the public. The salient features are a handsome gain in the population of England and Wales, a smaller gain in Scotland and a decrease in Ireland which is however, less than in previous decades. By the census of 1891 the total population of the British Isles was 37,740,283. It is now, if the cable reports quote the figures accurately, 41,454,219. The total increase in ten years has been 3,713,936. The subjoined tables show the population of England and Wales, Scotland and Ireland respectively as they were in 1891 and as they are today, with the increase or decrease:

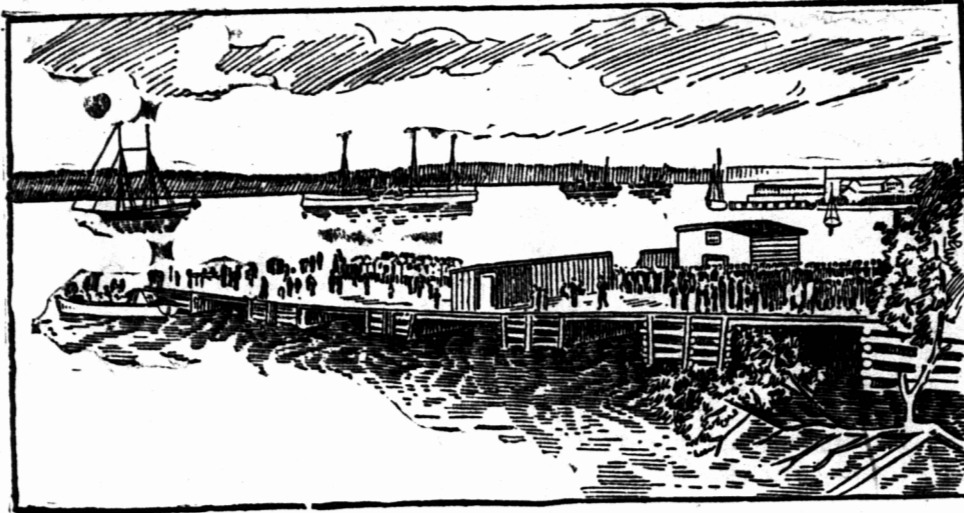
For the first time in history the population of Ireland has fallen behind that of Scotland. In 1845 Ireland had a population of 8,295,061, or nearly twice her present number. At that time the population of Ireland was nearly three times the number of the population of Scotland.

And now the Minister of Justice is looking into the constitutionality of the tax on commercial travellers in Prince Edward Island. It seems a little late in the day for such action. Why was not the matter looked into when the measure was first passed years ago.

Sir Louis Davies stated the other day that a test case has been practically agreed upon for the purpose of submitting to the Privy Council to determine whether the Provinces have proprietary rights in the fisheries within the three mile limits of their coasts. Very probably it may be found that the Provinces have such rights, but it is doubtful whether their financial position would be much improved thereby. The cost of the fishery protection service and the bounties paid to fishermen and boats considerably more than consume the interest on the fishery award. It would be both natural and just, as Sir Wilfrid Laurier says will be done, if the Provinces make good their claims to the fisheries, for the Dominion to at once cease paying the bounties to fishermen.

Both the leader of the Government and the leader of the Opposition appear to be agreed in raising the sessional indemnity to \$1,500, so that both parties must share in the responsibility for what is being done. The Premier is not quite accurate in stating that two months sessions were the rule when the \$1,000 rate of indemnity was agreed upon. Even during the first Parliament when members were paid but \$300 each the average length of the five sessions was 70 days each. There is doubtless rather more business now than there was then, but all the Provinces had been brought into the union before the rate was fixed at \$1,000. The Australian scale of salaries in general is one of the most extravagant in the world, and ought not to be cited as a precedent for Canada. If precedents were looked for some one might have thought of Great Britain, the Mother of Parliaments, which pays no indemnity at all to her law-makers.
