An interesting short copyrighted story entitled "According to custom" by A. M. Davies Ogden, will appear in the Saturday Guardian of 14th. Be sure you get it as it will not appear in any other paper.

A.; The William J. Morrice travelling fellowship, \$500, A. D. MacKenzie, M. A.; M. A. M. McKenzie also won the Crescent St. S. S. Scholarship of \$50. Messrs MacKenzie and Ross will receive the degree of Bachelor of Divinity by examination.

The announcement in question gives prominence not only to The Guardian but more particularly to "Prince Edward Island" the letters of the words being in large black type, and the former reads as follows:—"Charlottetown Guardian, Only morning Daily; 1005 average 8,048. Only Tri-Weekly 3,128." The Guardian also has taken advantage of its privilege under the same conditions as for "Roll of Honor" to insert its announcement under the following heading:

"The Want Ad. Mediums, a large volume of want business is a popular vote for the newspaper in which it appears." It reads as follows:—"The Charlottetown Guardian, Prince Edward Island's classified, medium, is a word, 20 a week. Minimum 10c."

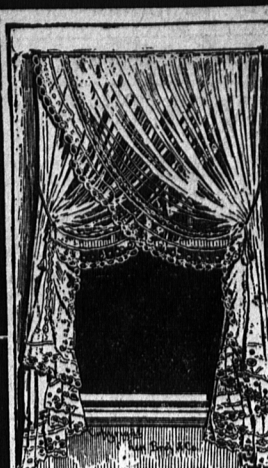
