THE NEW YORK HORROR.

A few months ago Chicago saw hundreds of its pleasure seeking people destroyed by fire in a theatre. Now fire and flood have swallowed up nearly double the number in and about an excursion steamer, close to the land in New York harbor. Human reason could have told what must happen in either case were fire to suddenly break out and get beyond control, but precautions were not taken, warnings passed unheeded and all these hundreds have perished. In both cases women and children made up the greater proportion of the victims. There is something inexpressibly sad as well as appalling in these disasters, which foresight and precaution might have prevented and in which the young, the innocent and the helpless are the sufferers.

It is sadder than the catastrophe in which a battleship is rent asunder and sent to the bottom with her hundreds of brave men by an exploding mine, or than the battle in which thousands may meet their fate. For the soldier and the marine know the perils of their trade and that they are always face to face with death. They are prepared if needs be to give their lives for the cause in which they fight, the ruler or the country which they serve. But to be suddenly surrounded by flame in a moment of gaiety and pleasure, encircled by helpless and panic-stricken friends and acquaintances, with only a choice between fire and flood as the instrument of death, is a horror from which all must recoil. It is to die uselessly, needlessly, ingloriously. Worse still when greed of gain has neglected the means for securing safety, as is so often the case, the disaster wears the aspect of wholesale murder accompanied by torture.

And yet we need not think of the

theatre managers of Chicago or the owners of excursion steamers in New York ashiners above others nearer home. Not half the theatres in Canada are as nearly fireproof as was the Liquor. And there are many steamers carrying excursions in Canadian waters that are quite as liable to sudden destruction with as little chance of escape as the General Slocum. We read of these disasters in far-off cities as if the like could never happen here. In a few months the busy world will forget the Chicago horror and the New York catastrophe. The call for fireproof curtains, for outward opening doors, for ready water and fire service in theatres dies out. The demand for a plenty of life boats with ready appliances, kept in order and tested, for trained crews to save the helpless in time of emergency, is soon forgotten. The excursion steamer licensed and equipped to carry five hundred will take on board two thousand as before, until another horror shall astound the world. Nothing grows irksome sooner than repeated calls to ensure the public safety.

This is the anniversary of the battle of Waterloo, fought eighty nine years ago on Sunday, 18th June 1815. It was a battle of happy augury, for it closed the series of many long and bloody struggles between Britain and France. It was their last armed conflict. Peace between them has been many times threatened since, but never broken. A vast commerce has sprung up since Waterloo across the Channel between the once bitter rivals and foes. By the recent treaty of settlement the bonds of peace grown strong by the friendly intercourse of eighty-nine years, are further strengthened.

PLANT LINE INJUNCTION.

Boston, June 15.—Judge Parker of the supreme court, to-day issued a preliminary injunction restraining Alfred E. Hays and George E. Gale from disposing of any of the \$450,000 capital stock of the Canada Atlantic and Plant Steamship company until they have secured the plaintiff, Alonzo W. Perry, for \$250,000, with interest, from December 5, 1902, which he alleges is the balance of \$285,000 due him from stock sold them. He alleges that the company voted a \$50,000 increase of capital to buy a steamship to run on Bras d'Or Lakes, C. B., and deprived him of the stock control. This, he says, took place at a meeting of the directors on April 8, 1904, while he was absent. He declares the stock voted was unauthorized and illegal, on the ground that the directors had no power to issue any stock, and in violation of the obligations of the defendants, as directors.

COLLINGWOOD, June 14.—Harvey Stephens, son of C. E. Stephens, merchant, Collingwood; Gerald Mussen, son of Rev. E. H. Mussen, Church of England clergyman, Collingwood; Harry Andrews, son of S. B. Andrews, of Collingwood Shipbuilding company, and Egmont Carroll, teller of the local branch of the Bank of Toronto, started in a sail boat to spend Sunday in a cottage on the Nottawasaga river. Sunday their boat drifted into the water works station full of water. Their hats and two coats were found in the boat. It is believed that the four young men were drowned. Searching parties have been all over both shores, but have found no trace of them.
