SEES CATTLE SHORTAGE

TORONTO, Feb. 13.—At the annual meeting of the Dominion Shorthorn Breeders' Association held at the Carls-Rite hotel, an optimistic note was struck for the dominion cattle trade.

The report submitted by the secretary of the association read in part:

"The predicted shortage in beef cattle has arrived not only in Canada, but in the United States. According to the American consul at Calgary, some 12,000 head of Alberta cattle were shipped into the United States between June 1 and November 30, 1927. This is the heaviest movement of Canadian cattle to the United States during a similar period since the American tariff was increased in 1922 and indicates the acute shortage which exists across the line.

Q. Who was Pere Marquette?
A. Pere Marquette was one of the great Frenchmen of the 17th century who, on April 18, 1668, founded a mission at Sault Ste. Marie. The February meeting of the W. M. S. of the United Church at Pownal met last week at the home of Miss Joyce Lane, Mt. Mellick. Despite the severity of the weather a goodly number were present and a successful meeting held.

Sunday Services

Services at St. Paul's Sunday were well attended and enthusiastically shared in by the congregations. The regular Communion services for the Sunday was held at 8.30 a. m.

For the morning sermon Rev. H. D. Raymond took as his text Psalm 72:8 "He shall have dominion also from sea to sea." He reminded his hearers that this is the verse from which the Dominion of Canada received its name.

Mr. Raymond said that on this Sunday, which is called Sexagisma the Church of England in Canada emphasizes the social service work.

He remarked that sometimes church people do not respond to the missionary appeal, perhaps because of the need for Christian service right at home.

This latter is surely a challenge to everyone. Historically the demand for social services comes first in the attempt to correct manifest evils.

Roused by that we go on to plan for our national and community life. Co-operation, said the speaker, is the key-note of success.

Outlining some of its problems he touched upon child-welfare, service to women and girls as exemplified in the Maritime Homes for women and girls, mental defections, prison conditions, temperance, labour, unemployment, the divorce question, and the prevention of obscene literature.

The great social service work upon which there is concentration just now is the problem of immigration—Empire settlement.

During the last 12 months of record 49,784 British settlers came to Canada, 21,025 from the United States and 73,132 from Continental Europe. Attention was drawn to the predominance of aliens which tends to lower the percentage of English speaking people in our population. In that same year 56,957 Canadians returned from the United States, but 94,631 Canadians migrated to that country in the same year.

In the evening the sermon was based upon "God and our National Life," from the text Psalm 67:4. The speaker traced the success of nations from the Psalmists time, intimating that one might think that chance governed all. Then he intimated that this was the preparation of the world for the coming of Christ, the event around which all other events revolve.

God has governed the world in the past; God is governing it now, and God will govern it in the future.

These points were illustrated with reference to our own parliamentary life and to present day conditions in the Mother land.

Concluding Mr. Raymond quoted Premier Baldwin's recent utterance to the Canadian Club in London—"Maintain the values, maintain the standards and may the prayer of Canada always be the prayer of the old Greek sailor which has been preserved for us by Seneca, "O God you may save me if you will, you may sink me if you will, but whatever happens I will always keep my rudder true."

Mr. Chas. Earle sang most effectively "Sun of my Soul."

ARMENIAN RELIEF

Sir,—As you are aware the local board of the Armenian Relief Association was organized some three years ago with the Hon. A. B. Warburton as President and L. D. Murray as Honorary Treasurer for Prince Edward Island.

We have recently been advised that the Association has withdrawn its representative from the Maritime Provinces, having turned over the responsibilities regarding the farm at Georgetown, Ontario, and the boys that have been brought to Canada, to the Board of Evangelism and Social Service of the United Church of Canada.

The Armenian Relief Association will now give its attention to the permanent settlement of the question of Armenian relief by assisting in the establishment of a colony in Syria, which scheme is being undertaken by the British Societies under the supervision of the League of Nations Refugee Settlement Commission. The probability is that at an early date an announcement will be made of a nation wide effort to raise a certain proportion of money which will be Canada's share in this enterprise.

While there has been no move made to wind up the affairs of the local board we have been advised by Rev. Mr. Kocharyan, who has been withdrawn from the field but the undersigned will continue to receive any contributions that may be sent in, which will be forwarded to the proper authorities. While no acknowledgment will be made through the press, receipts will be sent out to our contributors.

We wish to take this opportunity of thanking all who have assisted in supporting this worthy charity.
