The Pound And The Dollar "Two years ago the pound looked the dollar in the face and turned away." This phrase occurred in a recent speech by a well-known politician; but there is now every rea-

The improvement has had a noteworthy effect upon British trade, and at the moment manufacturing and export business is showing marked activity in several directions.
