**FRENCH FAMILIES WILL VISIT BROTHERS AND SONS AT THE FRONT**  
HALIFAX, Jan. 27.—Two fathers and two sisters of five patriotic young Frenchmen who are fighting for their homeland on the fields of Flanders, were in Halifax Tuesday on the first stage of a long journey to see the loved ones who have left their peaceful homes in St. Pierre-Miquelon, and who went to France when first the call came to help the motherland. They are M. Delisle and two daughters and M. Littaye, who arrived here on the steamer Pro Patria direct from the island colony of the french republic. M. Delisle has two sons fighting in the French army, and M. Littaye has three sons there, two fighting and a third in hospital suffering from a wound. They are well-to-do residents of the island and are going now to carry cheer to the hearts of their children, who cannot come to them. Both families intend to return after a brief visit with their sons, who will obtain leave of absence for the occasion.

**SKIRTS TO BE FULL AND A BIT LONGER.**  
NEW YORK, January 28.—Bring with her the latest assortment of new gowns, new hats and veils. Mme. Georgette, buyer for J. M. Gieding & Co., of Fifth Avenue, arrived in New York yesterday on board the Espagnole, of the Compagnie Generale Trans-Atlantique. Mme. Georgette has with her the latest Parisian designs and authoritative news of the changing fashions. The whole mood for the modes for the next season may be summed up in one short sentence, as expressed by her, thus:—"Skirts will be just as full, if not fuller, than last season, but they will be a bit—just a tiny bit—longer. The hats will be either large ones or little bits of affairs, like this I have on."  
Mme. Georgette tapped at a small creation of the milliner's mind. It was about the shape of an inverted plum pudding and not much larger for it allowed only room enough for her hair. What, it is very attractive and sat serenely without a maze of hat pins to hold it on.  
Mme. Georgette was in Paris about six weeks and will return in a fortnight for another inspection of the costume line.  
"In the gowns of the season," she said, "there will be lots of tulle for afternoon, evening and every day wear. I am bringing with me one Majorleins gown made by Agnes, which is of tulle and feta glace. It is a perfect gem of simplicity. It is of half pailier effect, caught by tiny bows of the same tulle. It will be for afternoon wear or for informal dinner."  
"I am bringing also a dark blue taffeta, made by Weeks, with broad bands of taffeta all brocaded in gold with transparent back. It has a high collar. The hips are caught in the same bands of gold so that it makes a sort of cuirasse of brocade over the hips. It has a cerise velvet collar, embroidered in gold. It will be used for informal dinner smart bridge parties and is dressy enough in material for any informal wear."  
"Hats will all remain very simple, with decided waist lines. They will be very full around the hips, much more than now, and just a trifle longer."  
"This season there will be big wonderful hats and little, high crowned turbans. Some of them will be like Lewis. They are just as popular as the big flat salonniers. There will be extreme and one is just as popular as the other."  
"I have brought lots of veils—an extraordinary collection of face veils. They are made with a mesh. Some of them have the round figure cut, encompasses the face, while others are like masks, very different from anything that yet has been worn in New York."
