The Presbytery of Prince Edward met in regular session in Zion Church Hall, Charlottetown, on Tuesday, November 5.

The minutes of the last regular session were read and adopted as read. Clerk, Rev. H. into the ministry of the Presbyterian Church in Canada through the General Assembly's Commission, on the reception of ministers were submitted to the court.

The Presbytery of Prince Albert and Saskatoon is making application to the General Assembly Commission on the Reception of Ministers for permission to receive as ministers of the Presbyterian Church in Canada Rev. E. Crossley, minister of the United Church of Canada, and Rev. A. E. Barnardo, B.A., B.D., minister of the Presbyterian Church, U. S. A.

The Presbytery of Moosejaw is making application to the General Assembly's Commission on the Reception of Ministers for permission to receive as a minister of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, Rev. D. A. Robertson, of Demaine, Sask., a minister of the United Church of Canada.

The Presbytery of Toronto is making application to the General Assembly's Commission on the Reception of Ministers for permission to receive Rev. J. W. Barton, minister of the United Church of Canada, and Rev. David Marshall, recently of Scotland, as ministers of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

The Presbytery of Toronto is also recommending Mr. J. E. Taylor to the Board of Education as a student for the ministry and suggests that said Board prescribe a suitable course for him preparatory to his entering upon the Study of Theology.

The Presbytery of Toronto is further recommending that the name of Rev. Archibald Thompson be placed on the appendix to the roll of the Toronto Presbytery.

The Presbytery of Montreal is making application on behalf of Mr. Donald S. Trail for permission to receive him as a Licentiate of the Presbyterian Church in Canada. Mr. Trail is a Licentiate of the Church of Scotland and is serving as assistant minister at the Church of St. Andrew and St. Paul, Montreal.

A few questions were asked regarding the standing of several of these men, but none of the members of the court raised any objections to any of the applications or recommendations.

The Clerk read a letter from the General Assembly's Committee on candidates for the ministry addressed to the Heads of the Homes of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Copies of this letter are being sent throughout the length and breadth of the Church so that one will find its way into every home. This letter sets forth clearly "that no more urgent problem is facing our Church at the present moment than that of securing a sufficient number of students of the right type to fit themselves for the work of the ministry."

we must never forget that it is a growing Church—growing more rapidly of recent years in proportion to her numbers than any other church in the land. As a church it, undoubtedly has a place of its own in this great young country, and has a distinct contribution to make to the building up of this land in the things that are of greatest worth. And that is why we as Presbyterians thought it worth while to struggle and to make sacrifices in order that the virtues of this old church might be continued here in Canada. But we must be up and doing and prove ourselves worthy of the glorious heritage that God in His providence has preserved for us.

If our church is to take the place it ought to take in the life of this great land of ours, we must provide and equip for it an efficient ministry so that our Presbyterian people wherever they are found will be properly cared for. Not only is this so, but we must also provide missionaries and other trained workers for service in the foreign fields for which we are responsible. It is surely plain to all then that there is here an urgent call for talented and consecrated young men and women to fit themselves for the various forms of life service that are open to them in the great task to which our church is consecrated.

Ever bear in mind that in the situation before us there is nothing to really discourage us, for we believe that there is no problem which is not within our power to solve. But the present circumstances present an appealing challenge and a ringing call to all of us to rise up and do our part. This is a call that must be heard more particularly by the parents in our Presbyterian homes. For it is, after all, from the homes of our own people that the future ministers and missionaries of the church must come, and in the moulding of this life of our Christian young people, no influence is so powerful as that of the home. The question then comes home with force to all of the parents in our Presbyterian homes as to what plans they are making for the lives of those children in their homes who, having professed faith in Christ, are already showing themselves to have qualities of mind and heart that give promise of useful service in the work of the church. Have you who are the parents of bright, healthy boys and girls considered your responsibility for properly directing their talents and energies? Have you really earnestly desired and prayed that their thoughts might be turned towards the work of the holy ministry or to the missionary service of the church? The need is evident to all, and the call is clear to all who have the gifts that the necessary.

"If, then, we believe, as the Master has taught us, that 'life is more than meat,' that it is not a matter of getting for ourselves, but of giving for the good of others—then where is there a life work that can be compared in true worth with that of proclaiming the everlasting gospel of the risen Christ—the power of which is the source and explanation of all that is best in the life of the world today? May we, then, accept this

sacred trust that has been given to us as a church, assured that when we pray earnestly and sincerely that God will send forth laborers into His harvest and prove the sincerity of our prayers by our works these prayers will then—but only then—be answered; the need of our church will be supplied and our hearts will be made glad by renewed tokens of the favor and blessing of God.

A very helpful discussion followed the reading of this letter on the best ways of getting our young people to realize their responsibility of giving their lives to the service of the Master.

Representatives from the three sections of the pastoral charge of Marshfield, Harrington and Mount Stewart appeared before the Presbytery, and asked to have Rev. M. E. Genge, D.D., appointed to this field for another year. These men spoke very highly of good work done by Dr. Genge in this field during the past year. At the communion services held recently eighteen new members had been received on profession of faith at Mt. Stewart and five at Marshfield. As it is only within the power of the Presbytery to make an appointment for six months, a six months' appointment was accordingly made, looking toward a further re-appointment at the end of that period.

Rev. Chas. J. St. Clair Jeans, Moderator of the Richmond Bay congregation, asked that Rev. D. F. Davies, Michigan U.S.A., be appointed as stated supply to this congregation for a period of six months. Mr. Davies had supplied the pulpits of this pastoral charge during the winter months of last year and it is the wish of the people that he be re-appointed for another period of six months. The request was granted and the appointment made.

Rev. M. Scott Fulton, convener of the Synod's Budget committee, and also convener of the Presbytery's Budget committee, brought the question of the raising of the money for the Budget before the Presbytery. A very interesting and helpful discussion followed. The appointment of a Budget committee in each congregation or section of a congregation has proven very helpful in raising funds for the Budget.

A. Ready, Wollaston, Mass., and also two sisters, Mrs. (Dr.) James MacDonald, Somerville, Mass., and Mrs. Michael Ready, Burlington, P. E. I.

The late Mrs. MacLellan who had reached the age of 79 years possessed to a marked degree, those Christian virtues which tend so effectually to endear one to family and friends. A host of the latter will long remember this kind and hospitable neighbour, who was ever active for the welfare of the community.

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The importance of the matter of raising funds for the Budget cannot be over estimated. For the Budget in a sense is the life of the Church. Of the 1281 pastoral charges in the Presbyterian Church in Canada, some 621 of them are receiving more or less aid from the Budget, and without this Budget would not be able to carry on their work. For the convenience of the members of Presbytery when taking up this work of raising funds for the Budget, the Presbytery was divided into three sections as last year. The congregations in the western section of the Presbytery are to be taken care of by Rev. R. Hensley Stavert, Rev. Chas. J. St. Clair Jeans, Rev. Fred Williamson and Rev. T. Lewis Williams; the congregations in the central section are to be under the care of Rev. M. Scott Fulton, Rev. W. Bruce Muir and Rev. M. E. Genge, D.D., while the congregations in the east are to be cared for by Rev. Quincey A. McDowell, Rev. Thos. A. Rodger and Rev. W. E. Davies. All of the Elders in all of the congregations are expected to be ready to help in this work wherever necessary. A letter dealing with the Budget will be sent out by Rev. M. Scott Fulton to all of the congregations in the Maritime Synod in the very near future. The Clerk stated that he had received a letter from Rev. A. S. Grant, urging that in raising the money for the Budget that all ad-receiving congregations be visited by representatives of Presbytery to review the amount of augmentation received and wherever possible to secure its reduction.

Rev. R. Hensley Stavert, convener of the Presbytery's committee on S. Schools and Young People's Work reported a number of resolutions passed at several business meetings held during the meeting of the Summer School, and Missionary Conference at Canoe Cove, Aug. 5 to 12. At the first business meeting held by the leaders and the students, it was moved, seconded and carried unanimously that the thanks of the Summer School and Missionary Conference be extended to the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island for having held

the Summer School and Missionary Conference, which had proved to have been such a splendid success in every way. And at this meeting it was further unanimously agreed that the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island be asked to hold a similar conference during the first week of August, 1930. At the second business meeting held it was agreed that, looking toward the future of the work among our young people of the Presbytery two committees should be appointed—a smaller and a larger one. This was accordingly done. The following smaller or more general committee was then appointed to co-operate with the Presbytery's committee on S. Schools and Young People's Work in getting ready for next year's work, namely: Angus W. Barnard, Freetown, Annie McKay, Freetown, and Donald Rodger, Belfast. Church Services TRINITY UNITED CHURCH

Armistice Day was suitably commemorated in the morning service. The chancel was nicely decorated with sheafs of grain and other fruits of the field with poppy wreaths adorning the face of the Altar. The choir also wore this emblem of Flanders Fields. A seat near the front of the Church was draped with flags and was occupied by His Honor Lieutenant Governor Hearst accompanied by his Aide, Lt.-Col. Hooper, in uniform. Mrs. Hearst was also present. As the Governor entered the congregation rose whilst the National Anthem was played. Professor Fletcher in his voluntaries rendered very appropriate music in fact the hymns and Anthem were in keeping with the special nature of the service including a splendid solo by Mr. George Johnson.
