Montreal Market Sidelights

Montreal, May 30—The liquidating movement gathered force in today's session of trading on the local stock exchange, following a comparatively quiet opening, and new lows for the bear market were generally applied in the day's broader and more active list. The average price of twenty stocks yielded nearly half a point to a new minimum for the index. The market here was without the influence of all Street, which market remained closed in observance of Memorial Day in the Republic to the South. While the trading movement covered a fairly broad range of issues, a number of the selected leaders were called upon to bear the brunt of the off-against, apparently of a forced nature. Shortest selling was directed against Montreal Power, which closed 54 points down at the new low of 22. Other issues to make new lows included Bell Telephone, Canadian Cement Preferred, Cokeshtk Plow, Dominion Bridge, Shawinigan and Steel of Canada.

Montreal, May 30 (By the Canadian Press)—Left to its own devices as New York was holidaying, the Montreal Stock Exchange gave a weak display today.

Selling pressure was again directed through the session, the close ending new lows in several cases, and nine of the outstanding one being in Montreal Power, which was sold to the amount of 3,972 shares and broke 54 points to 22.

Such active issues as Brazilian Traction, Bell Telephone, Canadian Cement Preferred, Cokeshtk Plow, Dominion Bridge, National Breweries, Shawinigan and Steel of Canada lost about a point to enter new low territory.

The weaker feeling lasted all through the session, the close ending new lows in several cases, and nine of the outstanding one being in Montreal Power, which was sold to the amount of 3,972 shares and broke 54 points to 22.

Very few issues resisted the general downward movement, the only one being unchanged at 94; Atlantic Sugar, in 3 to 27 on announcement that the shareholders were to be asked to accept a reorganization, their stock being absorbed by General Sugar, a new company. Three other small gains were recorded.

Canada Cement Preferred established a new high at 29, off 11 points; Bell Telephone lost 2 at 80; Cokeshtk Plow, Dominion Bridge, and National Breweries were down 1/2; Nickel lost 1/2 at 48; Steel of Canada lost 1/2 at 113; Shawinigan and Steel of Canada lost 1/2 at 74.

U. S. War Vets Demand Bonus

WASHINGTON, May 30—A weaponless army camped on Washington today, determined to stay here until Congress surrenders to its uncompromising demands. The army was made of up men who fought in the World War, 1,300 or more of them, beseeching that their service bonus be paid in full immediately. Sixteen truckloads of them, gathered from across the broad sweep of the country, entered the Capital from Maryland yesterday, weary and stained with grime of haphazard travel. Others already had filtered in, a few at a time, and more were expected.

They were fed and housed under arrangements made personally by a former Brigadier General of war days, police superintendent Glassford. He told them they would have to leave in 48 hours to save the local relief funds from such depletion that Washington's own destitute would be forced to go hungry. But the leader of the most organized contingent—330 men from the Pacific coast—replied they would stay till the bonus is paid.

WINNIPEG, May 30—Influenced by reports of beneficial rains over United States winter wheat area, wheat prices underwent setbacks in today's trade. Values at the close were 3 1/2 lower than Saturday's figures.

May dropped 1/2 to 62 1/2 and July and October each declined 1/2 to 65 1/2 and 67 1/2.

With all American markets closed today trading throughout was narrow and with long periods of almost total stagnation. A limited export trade was worked but it was not important.

Opening unchanged to 1/2 lower the market seemed content to coast along at that level until near the close. Reported selling shortly after mid-session and the market quickly dropped to the low points.

Cash wheat and coarse grain trade was slow. Prices generally closed sympathetically to the decline in wheat.

Money Voted For Veterans

OTTAWA, May 30—(By the Canadian Press)—Reports have reached veteran's organizations in various centres that there is no money in the reparations treasury for Canadian veterans who suffered ill treatment in German prison camps whereas the sum of \$300,000 was granted to naturalized Armenians who lost relatives and property in the Turkish massacres. It was explained at the Secretary of State Department today that these reports are not accurate. A vote of \$500,000 was put in the estimates last session to look after Canadian veterans who suffered in German prison camps. That amount is available.

In 1915 there was a massacre of Armenians by the Turks. Under the Lausanne Treaty it was arranged by Great Britain, France, Italy and Japan that the 5,000,000 in Turkish pounds, credit of Turkey in Germany, be used to reimburse the Armenians who suffered in the massacre. A commission sat in Paris and adjudicated on these claims.

Claims to the total of over \$8,000,000 was filed at Ottawa by Armenians in Canada who had become British subjects and who had lost property, fathers or mothers or wives or children in the massacre. Of these claims, the only ones to be entertained by the Paris commission were those where wives or children had been lost in which cases certain solatia were granted.

The remainder of the claims were turned back to Ottawa and for years the Government struggled with the problem as to what should be done with them. It was finally decided to award these claimants a total of \$300,000 taken out of the full vote of \$3,200,000. Errol M. MacDougall, reparations commissioner, made the awards all of which were cleared up a few weeks ago.
