THE senior and junior societies of the Baptist church held a united service last evening, at which reports of the various committees were presented. THE Natural History and Antiquarian Society takes its annual outing to-day. St. Peter's Island has again been selected as the scene of the Society's explorations. It will be remembered that last year the petrified remains of part of a pre-historic animal were found, and it is hoped that further fossils will be discovered to-day, as such specimens serve to accurately estimate the position of this island in geological time. CONCERT AT THE PARK.—The 4th Reg. Band gave an enjoyable program of music at the Park last evening, with one of the finest marine-escapes in the world. With an ideal evening as far as temperature is concerned, it is no wonder a large crowd was present to hear, enjoy and even criticise the Band. It is a rare thing in the smaller cities to find a band that merits musical criticism. As a rule general praise is looked for by the performers, and certainly as a rule neither hearers or press are niggardly in this respect. YESTERDAY the following were the sales at the meeting of the Cheese Board. The price was 9 cents, except Gowan Brae which sold at 8c. Stanley Bridge 303, Hazelbrook 100, Winsloe 193, Lakeville 120, St. George 100, Gowan Brae 175, New Dominion 100, Dunstaffnage 100, Souris 85, Orwell 265, Belle River 200 to Dillon & Spillet; St. Peter's 182, East River 110, New Perth 275, Dundas 170, Cardigan 80, to A. J. Biffin. The following cheese were boarded in addition to those sold.—Abram's Village, 105; Kensington, 400; Hillsboro, 200; Mt. Stewart, 125; Wiltshire, 220; Red House, 150; Red Point, 88; Morell, 100; New Glasgow, 250; Cornwall, 205; Union, 415. Making a total boarded of 843 white and 4108 colored. The Secretary was empowered to secure a set of scales to weigh the cheese in case of dispute, and also to secure the appointment of an official weigher to look after the interests of the factories. Messrs. Biffin and Spillet offered \$5 each towards the payment on the scales. Next meeting of cheese board will be held in two weeks' time. On motion, was decided unanimously that suitable rooms be secured for next board meeting. After the Cheese Board a meeting of the Dairy Association was held. There were present: President, Arthur Simpson, Vice do Lauchlin Mc Donald, Directors James E. McDonald, John Anderson, W. Jenkins and Secretary Treasurer Robert Jenkins. The assessment for 1900 was handed to the Secretary for collection. This is a levy of 1 1/2 cents on every 1000 lbs milk, and is the same as last year. Correspondence from Inspector Morrow was read, showing that with a very few exceptions, matters are proceeding satisfactorily. It was moved by John Anderson, seconded by D. Murchison, that an allowance of one half pound be made on all cheese sold. Carried. Hon. B. Rogers announced that the Government will offer prizes of \$40, \$20 and \$10 for the best cheese made during the season. One cheese of each month's make, either white or colored, to be judged. The Government guarantee to take charge of the exhibit when sufficiently cured, delivered in Charlottetown, and will hold it in cold storage, free of charge, until the close of the competition.
