No Extension Of Smelt Fishing Season, Report

OTTAWA, Jan. 24—(CP)—The Atlantic smelt fishing season will not be extended this year, the Department of Fisheries announced today.

The Department explained that several requests for an extension had been received but would not be granted.

"Under these circumstances, an extension of the current fishing season would probably result in a heavy carry-over of smelt, with consequent adverse effect upon next season's marketing," a Department statement said.

While the season varies for different areas, the season in the northern New Brunswick district particularly affected by this ruling ended Jan. 21. In other parts of the province it ends about Feb. 15.

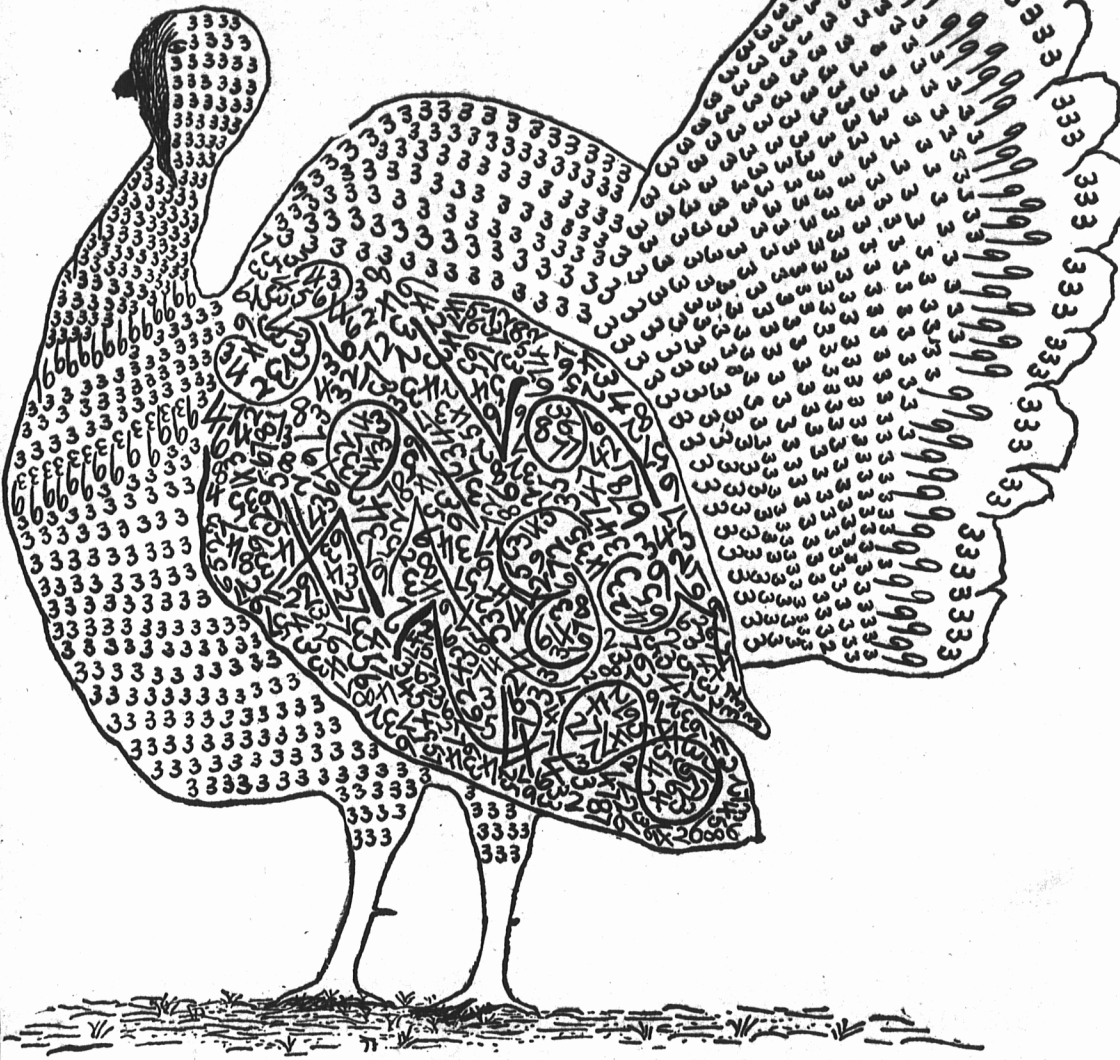
