

**Would Keep Gold At Present Price**

**JOHANNESBURG, Aug. 4**—(CP)—"I firmly believe that stabilization on the basis of 140 shillings an ounce for gold would restore the world's confidence in the future metal and might prove an example to be followed at no distant date by the great financial nations of the world."

This statement, by Sir Ernest Oppenheimer, M. P. for Kimberley and chairman of De Beers Consolidated Mines was made in a letter to the Rand Daily Mail.

The government, he writes, had said in the clearest manner that they had full confidence in the maintenance of the present price.

"Let them show that confidence," he continues. "Let the Union at least show that she believes, as she must, in the future of gold and stabilize—if it need be, alone—on the basis of 140 shillings per ounce."

"Let us make our position clear by minting new gold coins and putting them in circulation."

**Rust Old Danger For Grain Farms**

**WASHINGTON, Aug. 5**—(CP)—Farmers whose grain is threatened by rust this year, face a peril that has plagued the man with the hoe down through the ages. United States government scientists say the Romans blamed rust on a special God, Robigus, who periodically shriveled grain fields to wreak his vengeance on a wicked people.

Later the scourge was blamed on the weather because rust, usually is most destructive when it is warm and muggy and crops are late. Scientists say the plant disease often has reduced harvest to five or six bushels of shriveled grain from a field that should produce 20 bushels more of plump kernels.

Actually, rust is a tiny, fungus parasite that pierces the stalk of grain and steals food from the plant. Wheat is the chief victim of disease and when a rust-blighted field is harvested a cloud of black and red dust rises like a fog, covering men, horses, and machines. The dust looks like iron rust, hence its name.

Experts agree that little can be done after rust infects a field. Dusting with powder has checked the disease but this plan is commercially impracticable.

Two lines of attack have been developed by the U. S. department of agriculture: breeding of special types of wheat and other grains that will resist rust, and eradication of barberry bushes, which one stage in the life of black stem rust was passed on barberry bushes and that one bush could produce millions of spores. The wind can carry these spores to grain fields miles away.

Since 1919 a campaign to eradicate barberry bushes has been underway in grain growing states. Then, in 1935, rust caused a loss of more than 100,000 bushels in U. S. wheat areas. Scientists said wind had carried millions of rust spores from barberry bushes in the south to wheat fields in the north.

The size of single yarn is: medium, doubled yarn; fine, medium, coarse and hooking. Put shippers and owners' name on all parcels, address and instructions inside.

Send by mail or freight. Freight will be paid on 100 pound lots.

**Honey Good Source of Home-Made Vinegar**

Home-made vinegar of good quality can be prepared on the farm from a variety of raw products, provided they contain fermentable sugar in sufficient quantity. As raw materials, the juice of apples, grapes, berries or other fruit, and honey may all be used with success, but, whatever direction and precautions for making the vinegar are essentially the same. It is necessary to keep in mind that there are two stages in vinegar making, representing two processes of fermentation. These two stages are quite distinct. The first stage is the alcoholic fermentation of sweet juice, where by the sugar is converted into alcohol through the action of yeast. The second step consists in the conversion of the alcohol into acetic acid.

In making vinegar from honey, the honey should first be diluted with five times its volume of water to reduce the sugar content to proper proportions for fermentation. As honey does not ordinarily contain sufficient yeast food, other than sugar, it is advisable to add a quart of some kind of fruit juice to every five gallons of diluted honey in order to ensure a good alcoholic fermentation. In place of the fruit juice, if so desired, one-half ounce each of ammonium phosphate and potassium tartrate, obtainable at any drug store, may be added to the liquid. The procedure is then the same as for cider vinegar. Full directions for making cider vinegar and other kinds may be found in the circular "Vinegar Making on the Farm" which may be obtained free on request from the Publicity and Extension Branch, Dominion Department of Agriculture, Ottawa.
