HE WAS CUT OUT FOR A CRITIC.

Handy Man to Have About a Newspaper Office in an Emergency

The musical critic was unable to attend the pianoforte recital, but the handy man on the paper allowed that he could do the thing easily enough. And this is how he did it.
"Herr Diapason's recital last evening at Acoustic Hall was the most recherche event of the musical season. Herr Diapason is a master in cantilever, and both in his automobile and in his tour de force he wrought wonders of tonic stimulation. He was especially potent in his dolce far niente passages, and in his diminuendo crescendo appoggiatura he displayed a technological skill that was simply wonderful.
"There was also a marvelous musically abandon in the mute bars, the instrument in these parts of the score being forcefully impressive in silent fortissimo. But it was perhaps in audante capriccioso that he excelled himself. Here he discovered a coloratura, a bravura, and an ensemble that fairly electrified his audience.
"Herr Diapason it is true, occasionally erred in an overponderosity of rutabaga and again in a too lambent lustspiel, but these lapses were hardly noticeable in his rendering of eantibillious intermezzo. The recital upon the whole was a marvelous exhibition of poca 'hontas instrumentation and incandescent cavatina."
"Slug four, who takes lessons, said there was something wrong about it, although he couldn't say exactly, and the managing editor, upon looking the critique over, was free to admit that it was all Greek to him, still he said it seemed to read all right, so far as he could discover to the contrary, and it was quite in the line of the regular critic's composition—more luminous, indeed, and he didn't see why it shouldn't be printed. It was lucky, he said that they had so able an all round writer on the staff.

RECIPROCITY WITH CANADA.

Following are some of the stanzas:
It was our fault, our very great fault, and not the judgement of Heaven, We made an army in our image on an Island nine by seven,

And so we got our lesson, and we ought to accept it with gratitude,
We have spent fove hundred million pounds to prove the fact once more,
That horses are quicker than men afoot, since two and two makes four,

ENGLISH LEASES.

Queer Practice Of Making Them For The Lifetime Of Certain People.

(New York Times.)

A real estate broker who has just returned from a visit to his old home in Devonshire, England, tells of a situation there, which is due to the death of Queen Victoria. He says in Devonshire and some of the other southern counties when a tenant wants to lease a farm or other property he does not go to the owner and ask for a lease for twenty-five years, or for any other definite term. He simply says that he wants the property for as long as some third person not interested in the property, shall live. If the selection of this third party is agreeable to the landlord the lease is duly made, and in it the condition is set forth that the lessee shall hold the property as long as the third party named shall live.
Now, in Devonshire several of the large land owners have for a number of years made leases to last as long as Queen Victoria should live. Those who took leases on favorable terms during the early part of her reign have had years of good fortune, while the holders of later leases found them suddenly terminated.
The same land owners are now making new leases to last during the terms of King Edward's life. All such leases are not made on the lives of the King or Queen. On many of the smaller holdings the third person selected is some local personage of a member of Parliament. While this method of making leases is a sort of gamble and is decidedly inconvenient, yet the people interested seem anxious to hold on to the heritage of the old feudal system.
