**Induction At Malpeque**

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in special session in the Keir Memorial Presbyterian church, Malpeque, on Wednesday evening, August 8th for the induction of Rev. Fred Williamson into the pastoral charge of the congregation of Malpeque. The Presbytery was opened in due form by the Moderator, Rev. Andrew Brown.

Those present were Rev. Andrew Brown, Moderator; Rev. R. Hensley Stavert, Clerk; Rev. W. Bruce Muir, Rev. M. Scott Fulton, Rev. Thos. A. Rodger; Rev. Fred Williamson and Messrs Andrew McNeill, Robert McNutt, H. F. McKendrick, Angus Green, John D. McKay, John T. Murray, Douglas Jardine, D. M. Bernard, Andrew McLeod, Elders, and Mr. H. B. McKay, representative layman.

Messrs. R. E. Macdonald, Fred Clarke, Colin Mountain and Alex. Hiltz, Elders, also present later in the service. At the induction Mr. Fred Williamson, a newly-inducted minister and Rev. M. Scott Fulton addressed the people of the congregation. All the addresses were of a high order and the musical selections were well rendered. The service throughout was a very impressive one.

Just before the close of the service, Mr. Andrew McNeill, representative elder in the Malpeque congregation came forward and in a short address told of the splendid services rendered by Rev. R. Hensley Stavert as Moderator of the Malpeque Session and presented Mr. Stavert with a large sized purse. In a few well chosen words, Mr. Stavert thanked Mr. McNeill and the people of the Malpeque congregation for this generous expression of their kindness. The singing of "Oh God of Bethel" followed by the benediction by Rev. Mr. Williamson brought the induction service to a close.

A social hour was then spent in the public hall at which a dainty lunch was served by the ladies.

Rev. Fred W. Williamson has already proven himself to be a worker who needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth, and the outlook for the future of this historic congregation of Malpeque is bright with hope.

The Presbytery reassembled for a short while at the close of the induction service. Rev. Fred Williamson's name was added to the Roll of Presbytery. It was unanimously agreed that should Mr. John Flock, student Catechist in the New London field decide to not enter college in September that he be appointed to this field for another six months. The Presbytery then adjourned to meet at the call of the Moderator and club, of which public intimation was made and meeting was closed with the benediction by the Moderator, Rev. Andrew Brown.

**DIED AT 103 YEARS**

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 10. — Belonging to a race of long-lived folk, her father and her mother both passing the century mark, Mrs. Flora MacDonald of this city died in her 103rd year. Of Scottish descent, she spoke Gaelic as fluently as English and took pleasure in teaching the language to one of her granddaughters. She is survived by one daughter, May; eight grandchildren and twelve great-grandchildren.

Mrs. MacDonald is the fourth centennial to die in Toronto this year. The others were: Mrs. Jeanie Owens, 105; John O'Connor, 106, and Mrs. Catherine Batley, 105 years of age. When her last birthday arrived, Mrs. MacDonald showed great pride in the 102 candles on her cake, and insisted that all her friends who visited her sample the cake. It was Mrs. MacDonald's proud boast that her total doctors' bills did not reach \$10. The first house in which she lived was in Vaughan township, built of logs, and she could remember how the wolves used to "come and fight in our backyard and even put their feet upon the windowsills." She never was in an automobile, she stated.

**Moving Pictures Will Be Sent Through The Air**

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Aug. 10. — A time when moving pictures will be sent through the air to homes in all parts of the world was envisioned yesterday by radio leaders when "radio movies" were sent for the first time in history during demonstration at the East Pittsburgh plant of the Westinghouse Electric and Manufacturing Company.

Leaders in radio world and newspaper men attended the demonstration and saw the movies sent through the air to a screen 30 feet from the transmitting apparatus.

While still in the laboratory stage the processes were described as successful and having great possibilities. It was pointed out by engineers that although the movies were sent only a short distance the engineering principle is the same and they could be sent across the continent just as easy.

Ordinary motion picture film was used in a small, darkened laboratory, the broadcasting and receiving sets were turned on. As the switch was thrown in starting to broadcast it sprung to life on a small screen on the receiving set. While not as clear as ordinary movies the figures were easily distinguishable and subtitles readily readable.
