### PRINCE FUSHIMI'S TOUR THROUGH CANADA

All arrangements for the tour of General H. I. H. Prince Fushimi through Eastern Canada have been completed by the Grand Trunk Railway System, who will convey the party over their lines through Quebec and Ontario, with the exception of the journey between Lewis and Montreal, which will be made over the Intercolonial Railway. The Imperial train will be composed of a baggage car, dining car, two sleeping cars, and two private cars. The party will leave Bonaventure Station, Montreal, Monday morning, June 10th, at ten o'clock, and will visit Ottawa. Next day the journey will be continued to Brockville, at which point steamer will be taken for the trip through the Thousand Islands to Kingston, where train will be awaiting to convey the distinguished party to Niagara Falls. After spending a few hours at the great obelisk, sight seeing, the party will leave for Toronto, arriving there at 2.55 p. m. June 12th; remaining at Toronto until the following morning at 11 o'clock, when the journey to the Pacific Coast will be continued over the Northern Division of the Grand Trunk via North Bay.

The principal stations along the line will be profusely decorated, the Imperial colors—scarlet and white—predominating, and British and Japanese flags in profusion. In connection with this important tour the Grand Trunk will present His Imperial Highness and suite with a set of edition de luxe souvenir books descriptive of the railway and country through which he will pass, richly bound in handsome covers. They will include the following:—

An Annotated Time Table, printed on handsome antique paper, embellished with a series of illustrations in colors, printed by the Prisma Print process. This Time Table will give the names of every station passed, with descriptive notes regarding the interesting features on route, the time of the train at each station, the altitude above sea level at each point, population, and distance from Montreal. The whole will be enclosed in a handsome crimson French smooth calf cover, richly engrossed in gold, with a handsome title including the Coat-of-Arms of Japan and the word "Welcome" in Japanese characters. The inside of the covers will be lined with white water-d silk, and include pockets containing a map of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, and a map of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, both mounted on silk and bound in full Morocco covers, with the titles printed in gold on each.

Another book will be a history of the old Victoria Tubular Bridge, with interesting descriptive information regarding same, as well as a story of the Victoria Jubilee Bridge, together with prints in half-tones of both bridges, direct from photographs. This souvenir is a very handsome one, bound in real Russia leather.

Another souvenir of the tour will be an illustrated description of Niagara Falls and vicinity, beautifully gotten up in Japanese style, the text being printed on double pages on special Japanese paper, the illustrations being half-tones from photographs interspersed with the reading matter, tipped in at their proper places. The book is bound in oze-calf Roycrofters style, the title being in gold.

Still another book will contain a handsome series of half-tone prints, reproduced direct from photographs of scenes along the line of the Grand Trunk Railway system. This book will contain sixty-four beautiful scenes, giving the Prince an idea of the beauty spots that are to be found in Eastern Canada. This book is bound in scarlet Morocco, title page being stamped in gold, with the Japanese coat-of-arms, the Grand Trunk trade mark, and the word "Vistas."

Everything that will tend to make the tour over the Grand Trunk Railway System a pleasant one has been done, and will be carried out in the admirable way for which the Company are noted for doing things.

H. R. Charlton will be the official representative of the Grand Trunk who will accompany the Imperial party while on their lines.

## A GOOD LETTER TO THINK OVER

He may be accused at the hotel, train or steam boat, and politely asked to hand over twenty dollars. If by the removal of this tax we could increase our commercial trade, say four hundred, and they would spend at least one hundred dollar each, this alone would mean forty thousand put into circulation of which the farmer would get the largest share.

I was surprised when in conversation with some of the gentlemen connected with the Local Legislature, while the House was in session last spring, at the narrow, contracted views which some of them held with reference to this tax. Several of them contended that the Island would be just as well or better if the commercial travellers stayed away altogether.

Now, sir, are those the kind of men we look up to? Are they really fit to represent an intelligent people and to frame our laws? I say, decidedly "No."

This tax, imposed as it is upon a people who spend as much money as this average commercial man, is a direct blow to the interests of the Island in general. We should do everything in our power to encourage people to come here. Every dollar spent on this Island, I don't care by whom, or with whom, is one dollar put into circulation and is bound to benefit indirectly every man woman and child.

Why is it that the farmers of this Island do not keep their heads paid up but are some twenty thousand dollars in arrears? Why does the Government not insist upon their taxes being paid? Are they afraid of the influence they might have on election day?

I am afraid it is only too true.

Would it not be to our advantage, if necessary, to pay heavier taxes ourselves and thereby remove any obstacle that would hinder people from coming here?

People wonder why it is that our young folk are leaving here and going to western Canada and the United States. Simply because there is no encouragement for them to remain here. There are no industries of any kind. The people who have money take a grim, death-grip of it, and put it away at a low rate of interest, instead of trying to promote some enterprise that would be a benefit to the Island at large, and which, if properly managed should be a good investment for themselves.

Of course, I know it is hard to make any industry pay here while we have such poor communication with the mainland, but our first step towards bettering our condition will be to remove the travellers tax.

We need never expect the hearty cooperation of our sister provinces while we tax their commercial interests.


Yes, I say, P. E. Island will have to wake up and get out of the narrow rut into which it has fallen and realize that were not the "only people on the earth, and that the outside world can do without us, a great deal easier than we can do without them. I was under the impression that when we were promised the additional \$70,000 subsidy that one of the conditions was that the travellers tax was to be removed, but the powers that be seem to say differently now.

Is this the free-trading Government, which before it came into power, hung out the free trade ticket?

I appeal to the P. E. I. Railway, the Steam Navigation Company, the Ivey men and all interested in the welfare of their country to bring every influence in their power to bear upon the Government to have this tax removed, knowing that it will bring more people to our shores; not only the commercial man but his friends, of which every one of them has a number, whom he can influence either for or against us.

Don't have the outside world look upon us as a people narrow in our views, selfish and thoroughly satisfied with ourselves, but let us open the door of this beautiful little Island to our Canadian brothers and our American cousins, invite them here either to sell goods or to spend a holiday, treat them in such a manner that they will go away not only satisfied, but well pleased with their visit, so that they will advise their relatives and friends to come here to spend their holidays in one of the nicest little spots on God's green earth. Then I think we shall be sufficiently repaid to enable us to easily forget that we ever had a paltry revenue of \$88,000 derived from the commercial travellers' tax.

## A TRIBUTE TO GREAT BRITAIN

Paris, June 7.—In the chamber of deputies today M. de Pressense, Socialist, impelled the government relative to the attitude of France at the Hague peace conference. He referred to Great Britain as a "precious instrument of peace for the whole world" and declared that immense armaments meant bankruptcy for the countries adopting such a policy.

Foreign Minister Pichon, in reply, remarked that the coming conference was a veritable international parliament. France would remain true to herself by playing an unrestricted role of moderation and conciliation, similar to that adopted by M. Bourgeois, the head of the French delegation to the peace conference of 1899. The names and reputation of the French delegates, he added, guaranteed the useful fulfillment of their mission.

The chamber unanimously approved the minister's declaration.
