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BRITISH SCORE SUCCESS AGAINST GERMAN PLANES

Greek Troops Capture Hills; Take Prisoners

Fascists Reported Hurling Back Along Mountainous Battlefield.

ATHENS, Nov. 8—(AP)—Greek troops occupied more hills surrounding the besieged Italian base at Koriza today, captured hundreds of additional prisoners, including the commanding General of Mussolini's Centaur Division, and hurled the Fascists back generally along the mountainous battlefield, authoritative sources said tonight.

The capture of the additional hills was said to have forced a strong link in the iron ring being drawn around Koriza, which for almost a week has been pounded day and night by Greek artillery.

Capture of the prisoners, on the central front, was declared to have added the total to more than 2,500 since the 12-day-old Fascist invasion started.

Swiss Have Uneasy Night of Raid Alarms

Berne, Nov. 8—(AP)—Switzerland had an uneasy night of raid alarms tonight and at the same time Italy—once full of optimism for this little federation—launched a violent press campaign against the Swiss.

Twice before midnight the air raid sirens sounded over Berne and other cities in western Switzerland. The first alarm came because the nation's lights went out at 10 p.m. under the army's blackout orders.

But in Italy, where only a day ago the press commended the National Zeitung of Berlin and other newspapers and radio broadcasts were turned in a campaign against the Swiss.

The Swiss must not think themselves invulnerable—this is the latest warning.

Answering Axis attacks on the Swiss, the National Zeitung of Berlin said: "The Swiss are not invulnerable. Force raiders to go unimpeded, some Swiss papers are over German-occupied territory at least three hours from Switzerland only half hour from the Axis cannot stop British night raids, they argue, how can the Swiss be blamed?"

Spanish Observers at Naval Battle of Gibraltar

LINEA Spain, Nov. 8—(CP)—Spanish observers from this Spanish point claimed tonight that a British destroyer and a submarine entered Gibraltar late in the afternoon and were seen to be firing at the British ships.

Flames Envelop Krupp Works After Attacks

LONDON, Nov. 8—(AP)—A four-hour Royal Air Force bombing attack which left the vast Krupp armament works in Essen, Germany, enveloped in a huge sheet of fire—the longest and mightiest assault yet launched upon that vital war foundry—was announced by the Air Ministry tonight.

The bombardment began a little after 8 o'clock last night and went on intermittently through the night and into the early morning hours. When it was over returning pilots said that flames could be seen 60 miles away.

Legion Has Big Program Underway

Mr. Alexander Walker, President of Dominion Command, Here on a Tour of Provinces.

"The members of the Canadian Legion across the Dominion have pledged themselves to assist in every way possible in wiping out the threat of Hitlerism," Mr. Alexander Walker of Calgary, Dominion President of the Canadian Legion, said last night, commenting on the work being done by the organization on behalf of the fighting forces.

Mr. Walker arrived in Charlottetown last evening on the first lap of a Dominion-wide tour of the various Legion branches for the purpose of discussing the Canadian Legion War Services. He leaves by plane this morning for Halifax, where he will spend the week-end. From there he will go to Saint John, N.S.

"The members of the Legion feel that the biggest problem, next to winning the war, is the rehabilitation of young men now in the army and for this reason they have decided to assist in preparing these young soldiers to readjust themselves following the present conflict," the Dominion President of the Legion said.

Fire Destroys Barn at Freetown

Fire at Freetown yesterday afternoon totally destroyed a large barn owned by Colin Campbell of the Prince County farming community. Included in the loss was a neutral season's hay and grain crop and one pig, cattle, horses, and other livestock were removed from the barn a machine shed, adjoining, was destroyed, together with some farm machinery.

The fire is believed to have originated from a gasoline engine which was being used to saw wood. It was housed in a small building beside the barn. The wind blew the fire towards the larger structure and before help could be summoned to fight the outbreak the flames had spread beyond control.

Other farm buildings were not in danger as the wind blew the flaming embers away from them.

The official estimate of the amount of the loss was available but it was believed to be in excess of \$1,000. It was partially covered by insurance.

Two Calls For Help Come From Atlantic

NEW YORK, Nov. 8—(CP)—An appeal for assistance came tonight from the 4,993-ton British steamship Ridley, afloat off the Cape Verde Islands off the coast of West Africa.

The Ridley's distress call, intercepted here by MacKay radio, did not give her exact position but said she requires immediate assistance. Her position was estimated by shipping circles here to be about 340 miles off St. Vincent, one of the group of Islands. Cause of the fire was unknown.

Half U. S. War Output For Great Britain

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8—(AP)—A ruling that half the war supply output of United States factories will go to Britain and Canada was announced by President Roosevelt today while the priorities board gave Britain permission to place a new order for 12,000 American military planes.

The President said his so-called "rule of thumb" policy of a 50-50 split with Britain applied to heavy bombers and all other types of military equipment and increased the previously existing ratio about five per cent in favor of Britain.

Warns Against Non-essential Expenditures

War Effort will Suffer Unless Canadians Tighten Their Belts.

OTTAWA, Nov. 8—(CP)—Unless Canadians tighten their belts, Canada's effort will "fall short of what is necessary to stop the Nazis," Brooke Claxton (Lib., Montreal, St. Lawrence-St. George's) warned today in the House of Commons as he moved the address in reply to the speech from the Throne.

"It is now becoming evident that we are not going to be able to produce the war materials we shall need unless we restrict the consumption of articles which divert work or materials from war purposes," he said, although he recognized that the diversion from private consumption to public use was a "difficult question to the individual."

"The fact is that while we have supported national participation we are only beginning to translate national sentiment into personal action."

Canadians had to consume less, save more and steadily invest in War Savings Certificates and War Loans. People had not begun to realize yet how great the financial burden was or that it was going to become much greater.

Moving the address, Mr. Claxton endorsed the Government's move to implement the recommendations of the Royal Commission on Dominion-Provincial Relations as an essential war measure. He lauded, too, its joint defence arrangements with the United States.

Chamberlain Is Seriously Ill, Report

LONDON, Nov. 8—(CP)—Former Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain is gravely ill at his country home, Highfield, in Hampshire, it was announced tonight.

Mrs. Chamberlain announced his illness in a message to the press.

The King's physician, Lord Horder, is attending the 71-year-old former British leader. He lives nearby and is constantly on call.

Mr. Chamberlain underwent an operation for an intestinal obstruction July 29, and was discharged from a nursing home Aug. 12.

20 Are Brought Down In Day; 15 By One Squadron

Night Raiders Hit Air Raid Precautions Centre; Homes Suffer Most In Raids.

LONDON, Nov. 9—(Saturday)—(AP)—Nazi raiders intensively attacking a wide area of London overnight scored a direct hit on an air raid precautions centre killing several persons, but the assault slackened after midnight with long intervals of quiet.

Incomplete reports to the Air Ministry said 20 German planes were destroyed during the day, 15 of them by one hard-hitting Royal Air Force squadron. In addition, six more German planes were said "probably" to have been destroyed and two damaged.

Mist shrouded the Dover Straits as the raiders roared across to drop many flares followed by explosives.

The only fatality reported from a midland city under attack occurred when an anti-aircraft shell crashed through the window of one home.

Workers' homes suffered in nine-tenths of the damage inflicted by the bombers.

Anti-aircraft fire on the Thames estuary was reported to have brought down two of the night's first invaders, though others crashed through the thicket of fire to scatter flares over widely separated areas and then drop bombs.

The two planes bagged by the gunners were not believed to have been included in the air ministry's total.

Six British aircraft are reported lost or missing, but the pilots of two of these are known to be safe.

After a scattering of daylight raids across the country, early evening attacks shook buildings here, in southwestern England and along the northeast coast. Bombers also were believed to be ranging over Liverpool.

The Tower of London and St. Clement Daines Church, two landmarks famed in British history are said to have been marked by recent bomb hits.

U.S. Seeks To Revise Fox Fur Plan

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8—(AP)—The United States State Department issued notice of intention today to negotiate with Canada a trade agreement to revise the existing agreement concerning importation of silver and black foxes furs and skins.

An existing Canadian-American agreement now limits importation of silver and black foxes to 100,000 units including furs, parts of furs and skins and articles made from fur skins.

The purpose of the new agreement is to make the quota 1,000,000 units apply only to whole skins and live silver foxes for pelting purposes, and establish separate unallocated quotas for the importation of parts of fox furs and skins and articles made from furs.

No changes are to be made in the existing import duties.

ITALIAN SHIPPING ATTACKED

NAIROBI, Kenya Colony, Nov. 8—(CP)—A low-level attack on Italian shipping moving along the Jubba River in Italian Somaliland was reported today by the South African air force command.

A communique said the planes rained bombs on the Italian ships and then returned to strafe them with machine-gun bullets. The attack occurred Wednesday.

Arab Bloc To Resist Axis Is Discussed

CAIRO, Egypt, Nov. 8—(AP)—Formation of an Arab bloc to resist any Axis aggression in the Near East was being discussed in Arab circles here tonight in incident with a state visit to King Farouk's court by the Emir Abdullah of Trans Jordan.

Well-informed sources said Trans-Jordan, Iraq and Saudi Arabia would be parties to such a pact with the support of Arabs in Egypt and Syria. Egypt would not be asked to join until the details have been worked out, these sources said. The pact also would be aimed for the eventual inclusion of Iran and Afghanistan.


Iran, Afghanistan and Iraq have a pact with Turkey providing their assistance to Turkey in the event Turkey is attacked.

The Emir Abdullah is believed to be strongly in favor of Arab support for Turkey. He has close relations with present Turkish leaders and was educated in Turkey.

Among the Emir's visitors since his arrival here were Sir Miles Lampson, British Ambassador to Egypt, Gen. Sir Archibald P. Wavell, Commander in Chief of Britain's Middle East Forces, and Arab diplomats accredited to Egypt.
