As a spectacular production, the operetta was the best of the finest things seen in the amateur line in Amherst for some time. Prof. Wright has every reason to be proud of the success of the play." Yesterday there was launched in Charlottetown Harbor, a splendid 2-foot pleasure boat, fitted with a five horse power Imperial engine, for a club of ten popular young citizens. The craft was built by L. and N. Paquet, Souris, and is a V bottom design, capable of carrying a party of twenty. The engine is placed under forward deck and her speed will be about eight miles per hour. Austin Trainor, one of the owners, affixed on the stern a handsome name plate of gold finished letters which glitter in the sunlight and reflect the sparkling waters below. The Orient will be one of the best equipped pleasure launches of her style when completed and is well worthy of the attention which will be bestowed on her. Mr. Paquet has pleased the owners, as he generally does, and feels no little gratification over the boat's trial performance. His firm is at present engaged on a fifty foot launch to be equipped with a 24 h.p. engine, for main and parties.

Mrs. C. W. Kiely, Charlottetown, announces the marriage of Arletta Maud, eldest daughter of the late Inspector C. W. Kiely, to Cecil Bruce Jones of the Post Office Department Charlottetown, to take place Wednesday, June 26th.

At the police court in Charlottetown yesterday Allan McDonald, charged with a first offence against the Prohibition Act, was convicted and fined one hundred dollars and costs amounting to \$5.35 or one month's imprisonment in the county jail. The case against Samuel Morrison was dismissed, there being no evidence whatever to support the charge. Mr. Morrison was therefore acquitted. C. G. Duffy appeared for the accused.

The Maritime Merchant reports that in butter and cheese the entire market is slightly easier. Creamery is quoted 1c. lower than it was a fortnight ago. Dairy is somewhat more plentiful, but not enough to affect values; the feeling, however, is that the market is bound to be affected by the splendid grass situation very shortly. Cheese is remarkably firm or the time of year, but as the make increases in the next week or two there is bound to be a reduction in price. Eggs are easier, but supplies are not heavy on this market and no further decline is looked for at the present time. Prices quoted are: Creamery prints, 27c. per lb; dairy solids, 25 to 26c. per lb; cheese, large, 15c. per lb; Eggs, fresh, 21c. per doz.

The cost of living continues to ascend in Canada, according to an Ottawa dispatch which contains much of local interest. According to the latest estimates of the Department of Labor, the continued rise in prices was maintained during May, though not to such a marked extent as during the preceding month. The Department's index number which went up more than a point during April reached, the highest point in the record of the Department, during May a year ago. This rise of nearly ten points in one year constitutes a record in the history of the Department, and it is a noticeable feature that during the last year the lowest point was recorded during May and June, while figures for May this year show an advance over those of any previous month. Animals and meats advanced to unprecedented levels during May, an unusual feature of the market being that all low grades have advanced as steeply as the choice grades. Grains and fodders showed an increase during the month as also did fruits and vegetables. Decreases on the other hand were recorded in the case of dairy products and fish.

## A TRAINOR'S SUCCESS

A Guardian representative called recently at the training quarters of Fred J. Cameron, the famous trainer of equine stars of the first magnitude, and the practical pointers from this visit are here set down for all lovers of modern Pegasus, or equine speed merchant. In Mr. Cameron's stables are seven candidates for turf honors, several of which are colts, in the training of which Mr. Cameron is an adept. Mr. Cameron was formerly identified with the famous Hopper Stock Farm, Indianapolis, which is owned by Harry E. Hopper, a multimillionaire who is taking up horse raising and racing for the improvement of his own health, thus following the old adage of the English huntsmen, i. e., to wit—"There is nothing so good for the inside of a man as the outside of a horse."

spirit and tire his rival. In the feeding of colts the most liberal allowances should be given. The young and growing animal requires a large amount of nutritious food to develop vital forces necessary to take care of himself. Too much attention cannot be paid to the "balancing" of horses, particularly colts, as many a promising racer is spoiled in his early training by being not properly "hung out," thus causing a little interference or some untoward gait that is not easily eradicated. Care of the feet should be an important item with every horse owner. A low heel and a long toe causing an excessive strain on the tendons, leading to trouble which could easily be avoided by a little care. During his connection with the Hopper Stock Farm Mr. Cameron gave records to fifteen colts of three years and under, the fastest three-year old record being 2:13 on a two lap track. Several two-year olds made records of 2:30. A visit to Mr. Cameron's training quarters, while he remains here, will be repaid by the practical pointers and interesting information that can be derived therefrom.

### EDEN MUSEUM, NEW YORK.
