**SUCCESSFUL POULTRY KEEPER.**—Mrs. Joseph A. Hughes of Bedford, is one of the many women in Prince Edward Island who take pride in Poultry. She has however made a little more progress than many others. For some time past she has been keeping flocks of Pure Bred Barred Rocks and Pure Bred Black Minorcas. Occasionally however there has been an intermixture of the breeds, and she has noticed that among these cross-breeds there are some particularly good ones for hatching and has this spring a pen of ten cross-bred hens, each one of which has given a very large number of eggs in the year and particularly in the winter months. She is not a woman to make big predictions but she has hopes of getting a strain of good laying hens that are not addicted to setting during the spring months. We wish to congratulate Mrs. Hughes on her success in poultry and will watch with interest the outcome of her experiment in cross-breeding.
